

RETURN TO AN ORDER OF THE HOUSE.

(Mr. Field, 23 August.)

Presented by Mr. Colonial Treasurer, and ordered by the House to be printed, 26 August, 1859.



Staff Officer of Pensioners' Office, Hobart Town, 26th August, 1859

SIR,

I HEREWITH beg to forward the Returns requested in your letter of the 22nd instant, in preparing which, I may mention, the whole of the time of my Clerk has been occupied up to the present moment, and that at a time when the duties of my office, which you are aware are supposed to be of an exclusively Imperial character, are unusually pressing, consequent on my having taken over the Northern District, and from other causes.

I trust, however, that now the Returns have been prepared they will prove to be such as were sought for.

I beg to call attention to the fact that, although no less than 1620 souls appear by the Returns to have been introduced into the Colony under the arrangement entered into between the Secretary of State for the Colonies and the then Secretary at War, the "pauperism" that has arisen therefrom is of so trivial a nature as to be scarcely worthy of notice.

I cannot conclude without stating my conviction that the introduction of the Enrolled Pensioners and their families into the Colony must ever be looked upon in the light of a boon, rather than as a source of regret and complaint.
