

ESTABLISHMENT AT PORT ARTHUR.

REPORT FOR 1874.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to furnish the Annual Report of this Establishment for 1874.

At the commencement of the year there were 177 prisoners, 88 lunatics, and 88 paupers in the respective departments at the Settlement.

Upon my assumption of office on the 1st April following, the numbers were reduced to 156 prisoners, 88 lunatics, and 67 paupers; and which numbers were further reduced by the 31st December, when they comprised 123 prisoners, 89 lunatics, and 26 paupers, or totals respectively 353, 311, and 238.

The classification of the prisoners is shown in Return C.; but to avoid confusion in respect to the above figures, it must be understood that all those men termed "Invalids under Detention" are included in the number of prisoners, whilst the lunatics comprise the insane, whether their condition be free or bond.

The usual Returns setting forth in detail all the information in connection with the Establishment are duly appended, and with the exception of two or three points, it is unnecessary perhaps to offer any analysis of them.

The labour of the prisoners was continued to be utilised to the fullest extent, but owing to the cause already noted (reduction of numbers) that labour for the latter part of the year was confined mainly in supplying the requirements of the Settlement.

The conduct of the men generally was proper and respectful, and their willingness to work was satisfactory; but as a comparatively large proportion of them were incapacitated from hard labour on account of age or infirmity, a smaller result is shown than might have been otherwise looked for.

During the year one prisoner succumbed to organic disease of the liver, and four lunatics and eleven paupers died from natural causes and old age.

The health of the inmates of the several departments was, on the whole, remarkably good, excepting, of course, the cases of a chronic nature, which always added to the sick list.

The Dépôt for Paupers was closed on 1st July by all those fit for removal being transferred to Hobart Town. This proceeding, as a consequence, had the effect of largely adding to the cost per head for the maintenance of paupers, Hospital patients, and lunatics, as no corresponding diminution could be made in the total staff of the Establishment.

Again it would appear that the Estimate for 1874 was calculated upon a strength of 520, when in fact the daily average only amounted to 292.

These circumstances, therefore, taken in conjunction with the necessity of keeping up a sufficient force to supervise the worst class of men remaining at the Settlement, will at once indicate the futility of looking for any appreciable reduction in the expenditure during the transition state of Port Arthur.

A ready willingness on the part of every official to carry out instructions, and a steady attention to their respective duties, are matters which it affords me much pleasure to record.
