By the 3rd and 4th sections of the 18th Vict., cap. 5, the following articles are admitted to entry duty free, except in the case mentioned in the 5th sect.:—*

Animals of all kinds, hams, meats of all kinds (except mess pork), butter, cheese, flour, barley, buck wheat, bear and bigg, oats, rye, beans and peas, meal of the above grains and of wheat not bolted, bran in shorts, and hops.

^{*} The following is a copy of the 5th section of Act 18 Vict., cap. 5, above referred to:—"V. If the Governor of this Province shall at any time, under the provisions of the Act passed during the present Session, intituled 'An Act for giving effect on the part of this Province to a certain Treaty between Her Majesty and the United States of America,' declare the suspension of the treaty between Her Majesty and the United States of America, signed on the 5th day of June, 1854, then, while such suspension shall continue, the several articles mentioned in the Schedule to the Act last aforesaid, being the growth and produce of the said United States, shall be subject to the duties to which they are now subject, and no such article shall then be admitted free of duty, unless it was so admitted immediately before the passing of the said Act."

1. CANADA—continued.

Anchors, chain cables, veneers, hay, pig iron, green fruits, bark, berries, nuts, vegetables, woods and drugs used solely in dyeing, and indigo, bristles, burr stones unwrought, coal and coke, grease and scraps, hemp, flax and tow undressed, hides, junk and oakum, lard; lead, pig or sheet; marble in blocks unpolished; oil, cocoa nut, pine and palm only; ores of all kinds of metals, pipe clay, resin and rosin, saw logs, ships' water casks in use, teazles, broom corn, wood used in making carpenters' or joiners' tools, tallow, tar and pitch, type metal in blocks or pigs, wool, caoutchoue, cordage of all kinds, sailcloth; copper in bars, rods, or in sheets; yellow metal in bars or in sheets, bright and black varnish, marine cement, treenails, bunting, felt-sheeting, printing presses, printing types, printers' ink, printing implements of all kinds, bookbinders' tools and presses and implements of all kinds, old nets and ropes, cotton and flax waste, rags, fire-clay, and Russian hemp yarn.

The following articles were admitted to enter duty free, by orders of the Governor-General in Council, viz.:—
11th January, 1854—Locomotives, passen-

gers, baggage, and freight cars passing and re-passing on railways crossing the frontier.

13th July, 1854-Musical instruments for

the use of military bands.

The following articles are admitted to importation duty free under the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States,

Products of fish and of all other creatures living in the water.

Stone or marble in its crude or unwrought state.

Slate.

Butter, cheese, tallow. Lard, horns, manures.

Ores of metals of all kinds.

Coal.

Pitch, tar, turpentine, ashes.

Timber, and lumber of all kinds, round, hewn, sawed, unmanufactured in whole or in part.

Firewood.

Plants, shrubs, and trees.

Pelts, wool.

Fish oil.

Rice, broom corn, and bark.

Gypsum, ground or unground.

Hewn, or wrought, or unwrought, burr or grind stones.

Dye stuffs.

Flax, hemp, and tow, unmanufactured.

Unmanufactured tobacco.

Rags.

The following Articles were chargeable with a duty of 12½ per cent. as being non-enumerated, and have, by divers Orders (7th December, 1850; 11th April, 1851; 27th August, 1851; 12th January, 13th and 30th June, 1853; 6th and 16th December, 1854; and 26th February and 2nd March, 1855,) of the Governor General in Council, been classed among articles paying 21 per cent. ad valorem, viz.:-

Bar and rod iron, not hammered, charcoal made or refined, boiler plate, sheet iron not thinner than No. 16, wire gauze, and hoop iron not more than two inches broad, spike rods and old iron, iron in scraps, bars or sheets, and not otherwise manufactured, pine oil, tarred rope, when imported by shipbuilders for the rigging of their ships.

1. CANADA.—continued.

Hoop and tire for driving wheels bent and welded, connection rods in pieces, frames and pedestals rough from the forge, and brass and copper tubes, all for the manufacture of locomotives.

Ships' sails, prepared rigging, tin, zinc, hoop iron, and candle wick.

Bridge wire.

Draining tiles, printing paper, and oil cake. Ore dressing machines.

Machinery for manufacturing doors and window blinds.

Ships' blocks, travelling trucks, jib hanks, sheaves, signal lamps, dead eyes, shackles, binnacle lamps, dead lights, and com-

Machinery for the manufacture of woollen and cotton stockings, shirts, and drawers. Machinery for the manufacture of paper.

EXEMPTIONS.

Ashes, pot and pearl, and soda, salt, cotton wool, anatomical preparations, philosophical instruments and apparatus, printed books (not foreign reprints of British copyright works), maps, busts, and casts of marble, bronze, alabaster or plaster of Paris, paintings, drawings, engravings, etchings and lithographs, cabinets of coins, medals, or gems, and other collections of antiquities, specimens of natural history, mineralogy or botany, trees, shrubs, bulbs, and roots, wheat and Indian corn, animals especially imported for the improvement of stock.

Models of machinery, and other inventions and improvements in the arts.

Coin and bullion.

Manures of all kinds.

Arms, clothing, cattle, provisions, and stores of every description, which any commissary or commissaries, contractor or contractors, shall import or bring, or which may be imported or brought by the principal or other officer or officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance into the province, for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian nations in this province, provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be defraved or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom, or of this province.

Horses and carriages of travellers, and horses, cattle, and carriages, and other vehicles when employed in carrying merchandise, together with the necessary harness and tackle, so long as the same shall be bona fide in use for that purpose, except the horses, cattle, carriages, vehicles, and harness of persons hawking goods, wares, and merchandise through the province, for the purpose of retailing the same, and the horses, cattle and car-

riages, and harness of any circus or equestrian troop for exhibition, the horses, cattle, carriages, and harness of any menagerie to be free.

Donations of clothing specially imported for the use of, or to be distributed gratuitously by, any charitable society in this province.

Seeds of all kinds, farming utensils, and implements of husbandry, when specially imported in good faith by any society incorporated or established for the en-couragement of agriculture.

The following articles in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the province for the purpose of actually

settling therein, viz.:

Wearing apparel in actual use, and other personal effects, not merchandise, horses and cattle, implements and tools of trade of handicraftsmen.

The personal household effects, not merchandise, of inhabitants of this province, being subjects of Her Majesty, and dying

And the following articles when imported directly from the United Kingdom, or from any British North American province, and being the growth, produce, or manufacture of the said United Kingdom, or of such province respectively, viz.:

Animals, beef, pork, biscuit, bread, butter, cocoa paste, corn or grain of all kinds, flour, fish, fresh salted, or dried or pickled, fish oil, fins or skins, the produce of fish or creatures living in the sea, gypsum, horns, meat, poultry, plants, shrubs, and trees, potatoes and vegetables of all kinds, seeds of all kinds, skins, pelts, furs, or tails undressed, wood, viz., boards, planks, staves, timber, and firewood.

2. NOVA SCOTIA.

CHAPTER XII.—OF CUSTOMS DUTIES.*—Passed 31st March, 1851.

1. This chapter shall come into operation on the 1st day of April, in the year of our Lord 1851, and shall continue in force until the 1st day of April, 1852.

2, There shall be collected and paid unto Her Majesty, for the use of the province, upon all goods brought into this province by sea or inland carriage, the several duties set forth in figures in the table hereinafter contained, denominated "Table of Duties," opposite the respective articles in such table mentioned, according to the value, number, or quantity of every such article.

3. Animals certified by the president and secretary of any agricultural society to have been imported for the purpose of improving the breed, shall be admitted duty

free.

4. There shall be collected and paid unto Her Majesty, for the use of the province, upon all spirituous liquors distilled, compounded, or made within the province, and which in the table are specifically enumerated, the several duties therein stated.

5. The goods mentioned in the table hereinafter contained, denominated "Table of mptions," shall be free of duty.

6. The duties shall be collected, paid, and received according to the British weights and measures in use in this province, and where the duties are in the table of duties imposed according to any specific quantity, value or number, the same shall apply in like proportion to any greater or less quantity, value or number.
7. The duties shall be collected, paid and received, and the proceeds thereof applied

under the provisions of the provincial statutes from time to time in force concerning the

same.

8. The duties shall be paid to the collectors of the colonial revenue, and received at the Receiver General's Office, either in Treasury notes of the province at their full value of

20s. each, or in current coin at their legal rate of tender.

9. Duties paid into the Receiver General's Office shall be carried to account of the provincial revenue, and become part of the public funds, and shall be paid and applied to such purposes, and no other, as may be expressed in the provincial statutes from time to time in force, and shall, even when authorised by any such statute, be drawn only by warrant under the hand and seal of the Governor.

10. The Governor in Council may, whenever it shall be thought advisable so to do, declare by proclamation what articles, the growth, production, or manufacture of the British North American possessions of Canada, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island or Newfoundland, or any of them, may be imported into the province free of duty, and may declare in what manner, and under what restrictions, the same may be so imported; but if wheat flour, the production of Canada, be allowed under such proclamation to be imported duty free, such flour shall be admitted duty free, whether it comes direct from Canada or through warehouse in the United States; but in the latter case it must be certified to be the production of Canada.

11. Whenever the importation into the United States of America of the following articles of the growth and production of British North America, viz., grain and bread stuffs of all kinds, potatoes and other vegetables, fruits, seeds, hops, hay and straw, animals, salted and fresh meats, butter, cheese, lard, tallow, hides, horns, wool, undressed skins, furs of all kinds, ores of all kinds, iron in pigs and blooms, copper, lead in pigs, grindstones and stones of all kinds, earth, coals, lime, ochres, gypsum ground or unground, rock salt, wood timber, and lumber of all kinds, firewood, ashes, bark, fish, fish oil, train oil, spermaceti oil, head matter and blubber, fins and skins the produce of fish or creatures

^{*}By a subsequent enactment, intituled (chap. 2) "An Act to continue and amend the Revenue Laws," this Act is continued and amended as follows:—

2. Chap. 12, "Of Customs Duties," is amended by adding to the 11th clause thereof the following words: "Provided, that if at any time hereafter Her Majesty, by Order in Council, shall declare that by virtue of any treaty with Her Majesty, any other foreign nation is entitled to trade with Nova Scotia on the same terms as the United States, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, and he is required, forthwith on the receipt of such Order in Council, to issue a proclamation, declaring that from the date thereof, or from such other day as may be fixed by Her Majesty in Council, the duties on all such articles as are by this chapter allowed to be imported free of duty, being the growth and production of the United States, shall cease on the like articles, being the growth and production of such foreign nation; and thereupon the duties on such last mentioned articles shall cease to be payable, so long as such foreign nation shall allow the free importation of the like articles, being the growth and production of Nova Scotia;" and the chapter so amended is hereby continued until the first day of April, 1853.

3. Wheat flour, the production of Canada, imported into this province, shall be admitted through a warehouse in the United States, or a port in the British Provinces, being duly certified as to its origin, on the same terms as if imported direct.

And the Act 17 Vict., c 9, "An Act to continue and further amend the Laws imposing Customs Duties," passed 31st March, 1854, continues the foregoing enactments, until the 1st April, 1855, with the exception that the duty on salted beef and pork is reduced from 6s. sterling per hundred weight to 4s. sterling per barrel on each of those articles respectively.

2. NOVA SCOTIA-continued.

living in the water, or any of such articles, shall be by law admitted free from duty, the Governor in Council may, by proclamation in the Royal Gazette, fix a short day thereafter on which the duties on like articles, or any of them, being the growth and production of the United States, shall cease; and from and after the day so appointed all the articles specified in the proclamation, being the growth and production of the United States, shall be admitted into the province duty free, upon such proof of origin and character as may be required by any order of the Governor in Council.

CLAUSE II.—And be it enacted that, from and after the passing of this Act, there shall be raised, levied, and collected, and paid to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, for the use and benefit of the Government of these islands, the duties under mentioned, upon the several articles therein enumerated, upon the importation of the same into this Government: Provided, that the several articles of gunpowder, ammunition, arms, utensils of war, coffee, sugar (not being refined in Bond in the United Kingdom), molasses, rum, base or counterfeit coin, mentioned and contained in the table of prohibitions and restrictions in the Act of the imperial Parliament of the 8th and 9th Vict., c. 93, shall not be imported into the island, except under the rules, regulations, prohibitions, and restrictions in the said Act of the Imperial Parliament mentioned and contained.

EXEMPTIONS.

The following articles may be imported without the payment of any duty whatever:—

Articles imported or supplied out of a bonded warehouse for the colonial service; articles imported or supplied out of a bonded warehouse for the use and accomodation of any officer of Her Majesty's army or navy on full pay and doing duty within these islands, upon

the production to the receiver-general or other proper receiver, of a certificate signed by the officer commanding Her Majesty's troops in the Colony or garrison, or by the senior naval officer on the station, as the case may be, that the articles claimed as exempt from duty are bonû fide imported or supplied, as the case may be, for the purposes contemplated hereby.

15. BAHAMAS—continued.

Articles of every description imported or supplied from a bonded warehouse for the use of the Governor.

Bulbs and roots, seeds of all kinds, shrubs and trees imported for planting; bullion; coin; copper, old, and composition, and only fit to be re-manufactured; cotton wool; Indian corn; diamonds; dye woods and stuffs, and divi divi; flax; fruits (apples excepted), and vegetables of all kinds not in sugar or syrup, or otherwise preserved; hemp; ice; iron, old, fit only to be re-manufactured lignum vitæ; mahogany; manures of all kinds; maps; metalline ores: passengers' baggage; poultry, game, and fresh meat of all kinds not preserved in any way; printed books and pamphlets; philosophical instruments and apparatus; provisions and stores of every description imported or supplied from a bonded warehouse for the use of Her Majesty's land or sea forces; raw hides; specimens of natural history, mineralogy, or botany; tortoise-shell; tow; turtle and fresh fish, not preserved in any way; wax; wood, cedar, and yellow.

Provided always, that if metalline ores, raw hides, dye woods and stuffs, divi divi, mahogany, lignum vitæ, cedar and yellow wood, wax, hemp, flax, iron, cotton wool, or tortoise-shell, proposed to be exempted from import duties, shall be brought otherwise than by regular importation into any port or place of this Colony, and sold at public auction, whether such sale shall take place by order of a court of law or otherwise, there shall be imposed and paid upon the gross amount of such sales, in addition to any other auction duty chargeable on such sales, an auction duty or tax of five such sales, an auction duty or tax of five pounds per centum; and the vendue master or marshal selling any such goods, shall retain such duty of five pounds per centum out of the gross sales so sold by him, and shall forthwith pay the same over to the receiver-general, or other proper receiver; and if such vendue master shall neglect to retain such duty, or having retained the said duty, shall neglect to pay the same over as aforesaid every such vendue. the same over as aforesaid, every such vendue master or officer shall be personally liable therefor, and the same may be recovered against him by action of debt.

Prohibitions.

The following articles are prohibited from importation into the Colony:—
Books, drawings, and engravings of an immoral or indecent character, and base and counterfeit coins.

Export duty on salt abolished.

TONNAGE DUTY-ONE SHILLING.

On each and every ton of the registered tonnage of every vessel (except as hereinafter excepted) arriving within these islands from any port or place without the limits thereof: Provided always that there shall be allowed in favour of vessels arriving in ballast and taking away a full and entire cargo of Bahama produce, and of vessels arriving with part cargo and filling up with Bahama produce, without landing any part of their original cargo, a draw-

back of one-half of such duty. Provided also, that the following vessels shall be totally exempt from the payment of such duty, viz.:—Steam-vessels, vessels arriving in ballast and departing in ballast, or arriving with cargo and not landing or transhipping any part thereof. Vessels employed in turtling, fishing, or sponging, and arriving without any cargo other than turtle, fish, or sponge.

All articles not enumerated in the foregoing tariff, imported under British, Ionian, Austrian, Greek, Neapolitan, Russian, Tuscan, Sardinian, Papal, Dutch, and Belgian flags, pay an ad valorem duty of 7 per cent.

Under all other flags, 8 per cent.

Clothing, arms, and accoutrements, for the use of the troops of the protecting State, are exempted from import duties.

Duties between Island and Island of the States.

Native manufactures and produce, wine excepted (see foregoing tariff), free.

Foreign Wines:

If in Ionian vessels, exempt.

If in foreign vessels, Austrian Lloyd's steamers excepted, three-fourths of original import duty on those articles paying at a fixed rate, and 5 per cent. on articles paying

an ad valorem duty.

Transit of foreign salt, 50 per cent.

By Acts of Parliament, dated 2nd June, 1825, and 20th March, 1830, all the Islands were declared free ports, goods deposited therein paying 1 per cent. for the period of deposit; but by the Acts dated 15th April, 1837, 25th March, 1847, and 6th December, 1849, that impost, as well as the transit duty of 1 per cent. in the transhipment of merchandise, was abolished.

By Act of Parliament, dated 14th August, 1842, the importation into the Island of Paxo of oil, in transit, from the opposite continent, is permitted free of duty.

Salt and gunpowder are public monopolies throughout the Island.

Exports from the United States of the Ionian Islands are regulated by Acts of Parliament, dated 8th June, 1835, 26th April, 1837, and 29th May, 1847.

Oil and currants, 18 per cent. ad valorem.

Soap, 8 per cent. ad valorem.

Valonia, 6 per cent. ad valorem.

All other articles, free.

N.B.—Oil shipped in vessels under Ionian colours, for the purpose of being conveyed from one Island to another of the States, pays the duty of only 7 per cent. ad valorem.

Construction of Roads.

By Acts of Parliament, dated 24th May, 1831, 20th May, 1833, 29th June, 1837, and 18th April, 1844, the following Duties were authorised to be levied for the construction and repairs of roads, streets, &c., viz.:
