

No. 43, were received at this Office for examination on the 5th May, and returned to the Treasury, duly audited, on the 11th instant. I have now the honor to submit my Report thereon for the information of Parliament, in accordance with Clause 26 of "The Audit Act."

It is satisfactory to again state that no serious irregularity has occurred in the Accounts of the Collectors of Revenue since my last Report.

Rent of Cronn Lands.—Some correspondence has taken place with regard to the large arrears of Rent of Pastoral Leases and Occupation Licences referred to in my last Report, but no improved arrangement for securing prompt payment, so far as I am aware, has been arrived at. There can be no doubt that a very large amount of revenue is annually lost through the want of a proper system for collecting these Rents. It is hoped, therefore, that the matter will receive the attention it demands.

Expenditure requiring Parliamentary provision.—A Return is given in Appendix (A) of Expenditure authorised by the Governor in Council under Clause 19 of Schedule 2 of "The Audit Act," 52 Vict. No. 43, £20,275 14s. 7d., being for excess of Expenditure over Votes, or new Expenditure of the year 1889, and £692 17s. 8d. for arrears of Expenditure of former years; the greater portion of the latter is for amounts not claimed until the votes previously providing for the Expenditure had lapsed. The reduction on the £1,000,000 would therefore amount to £29,592 9s. 11d., of which £12,500 is provided in the schedule of appropriation under the Act, leaving £17,092 9s. 11d. for which provision is required. The total schedule of appropriation under the Act is stated at £1,003,628, but this amount ought to have been shown as £999,428, an error in the amount stated as providing for expenditure under "The Public Works Act," 52 Vict. No. 66, having occurred, the proper amount being £21,925 instead of £26,125 stated in the schedule; this will leave £572 available either for the reduction of the excess loss or for any other purpose that may be decided upon.

DEBT OF THE COLONY.

The Debt of the Colony on 31st December last amounted to £5,070,570, as explained below; the Balance Sheet shows the amount at £5,103,870, but these figures are simply the amount outstanding at that date; the Treasury Bills authorised, but not issued, under 53 Vict. No. 65, for Public Works, would increase the amount by £200,000, whilst the Debentures and Treasury Bills due in 1890 and 1891, which were provided for in the last £1,000,000 Loan, would reduce the same by £233,300. The increase of Debt since 30th June, 1889, would therefore amount to £199,200, being the addition of the Treasury Bills referred to, less Debentures for £800 due in 1889 paid off by the Public Debts Sinking Fund Commissioners.

COLONIAL STOREKEEPER'S ACCOUNTS.

The Colonial Storekeeper's Accounts were received on 3rd May, and a special Report thereon forwarded to you on the 14th of the same month. It is satisfactory to notice that considerable improvement has taken place with regard to the correctness and the time in which these Accounts have been rendered as compared with former years.

QUERIES AND LETTERS NOT SATISFIED.

Owing to care and attention bestowed by the Heads of the several Departments to the matters brought Owing to care and attention bestowed by the Heads of the several Departments to the matters brought under notice, only two Queries raised during 1889 remain unsatisfied; and my thanks are specially due to the Treasury, through which most of the Queries pass, for the promptness and care shown in this respect. The Letters and Queries now unsatisfied are the following:—

Query No. 8, 20th July, 1887.—Re Dividend Tax payable by the Queenborough Cemetery Company.

Letter to the Chief Secretary, 14th June, 1889.—Respecting the audit of the Accounts of the Curator of Intestate Estates, and with reference to a Resolution passed by both Houses of Parliament in respect theorets. When this matter was noticed in the last Penert it was benefit that the General world make

thereto. When this matter was noticed in the last Report it was hoped that the Government would make arrangements for complying with the said Resolution, but subsequently this did not appear to be the case; the correspondence is therefore published in Appendix (B) for the information and consideration of Parliament.

Query, 23rd September, 1889.—Respecting payment to Mr. H. B. Mugliston for legal expenses neurred by the Cambridge Rabbit Trust. In this case payment has been made by the Treasury contrary, apparently, to be provisions of Clause 19 of Schedule 2 of the Audit Act. As the correspondence is very voluminous, a snort précis only of the case is given.

The claim was sent to the Audit Department in the usual manner, with the authority of the Governor in Council, for the Auditor's report, and after it had been read objection was taken on the ground that payment could not be properly authorised under Clause 19 of Schedule 2 of the Audit Act, but should have been provided for under Clause 2 of Schedule 3; this opinion having been formed by the consideration (with other circumstances) that the matter had been referred to the Minister of Lands and Works in the first instance on the 15th December, 1888, and that Parliament had met subsequently. On the matter being referred to the Honorable the Attorney-General he considered that the Government ought to pay the claim, and interpreted Clause 19 of Schedule 2 as intending to provide for all unforeseen or exceptional cases; finally, the claim was paid by the Honorable the Treasurer without the report of the Auditor, required under Clause 19, upon receiving from the Honorable the Attorney-General a Minute to the effect that payment had been duly authorised. Arising out of the above case a correspondence has taken place with regard to the clause of the Audit Act referred to, introducing matter of grave importance. I consider it my duty, therefore, to publish the same in Appendix (C), in the hope that the subject will be considered during the coming Session, and that definite instructions thereon will be framed by Parliament for the guidance of the Treasury and Audit Departments. APPENDIX B.

CORRESPONDENCE respecting the Audit of the Accounts of the Curator of Intestate Estates.

Audit Department, 14th June, 1889.

RESPECTING correspondence which has already taken place with regard to the Audit of the Accounts of the Curator of Intestate Estates, I have the honor to again bring the matter under the notice of the Government, feeling that I may be blamed for neglect of duty at some future time if this should not have been done, because by Resolution of both Houses of Parliament it has been affirmed that "it is undesirable for the Accounts of any Public Department to be exempt from the scrutiny of the Colonial Auditor; and that the Accounts of the Curator of Intestate Estates, in respect of any public moneys, should in future be audited by the Auditor in the same manner as all other public accounts," and therefore I am thereby placed under an obligation as Auditor to use every possible means to comply with the wishes of Parliament. With due respect, I also venture to say that, in my opinion, this Resolution also places the Government under an obligation to assist the Auditor in a way that would make it possible to carry out an evident public duty; but, although the refusal of the Curator of Intestate Estates to allow an audit of his Accounts within the meaning and intention of this Resolution has been reported to the Government, such assistance has not as yet been afforded. The reasons which guided me in bringing this matter under notice previously have already been placed in your hands, and need not therefore be repeated here; but I beg to point out that the provision of a Fee for Audit in the Schedule of "The Intestate Estates Act," 17 Vict. No. 4, which cannot apparently be properly appropriated by the Curator for his own use and benefit, appears to prove that an audit beyond the passing of the Accounts by a Judge is intended. Another reason which ought to have some weight in considering this subject is that the Intestate Estates are audited by the Auditor-General in all the Australian Colonies.

In urging upon the Governmen a reconsideration of this matter, I wish it to be distinctly understood that no personal consideration is aimed at. The present Curator is a gentleman for whom I have the greatest respect, and a high opinion of his integrity and honor; but the present holder of the office should not be thought of in this question, but future contingencies provided against; and the fact of many cases of serious irregularities in the Accounts of valued and trusted officers having been discovered in late years in this and the other Colonies should also be considered, and to some extent this has influenced me in again referring to a subject which has been a source of unpleasantness and anxiety to me.

The opinion of the Solicitor-General under date May 7, 1888, does not leave this matter in the satisfactory position to which it should be brought; and the Resolution of Parliament passed respectively November 3 and 23 by House of Assembly and Legislative Council cannot well be disregarded; and now the Auditor-General has called attention to the fee for auditing provided in the Act dealing with Intestate Estates, and to the fact that Intestate Estate funds are subject throughout the Colonies to the Auditor-General, it appears desirable that this matter be again revived.

The Auditor-General appears to have entirely forgotten that his view of the scope and intention of the Resolution upon the question of auditing the Curator's Accounts, which was agreed to by both Houses of Parliament in the Session of 1887, was brought before the House of Assembly last year by the Hon. W. H. Burgess, and that the motion moved by that gentleman for the purpose of endorsing and giving effect to the Auditor-General's contention was rejected. I am not insensible of the advantages of the system of auditing the Accounts of Intestate Estates which is in force in the other Australasian Colonies, and I have no wish to oppose the introduction of a similar system into this Colony if such is the wish of the Legislature; but to do so would require an entire remodelling of the Act 17 Vict. No. 4, under which the estates of intestate persons are now administered in Tasmania, and I have already so many Bills in preparation on more urgent matters for the coming Session of Parliament that I cannot undertake that piece of work at present. At the same time I desire to state that I believe our present system has advantages of its own which would be lost if the arrangements existing in the neighbouring Colonies were substituted for it. I have already pointed out, in the correspondence which took place on the subject in the year 1887, what I consider would be the disadvantageous results of taking the audit of the Curator's Accounts out of the hands of the Judges of the Supreme Court and placing it under the Audit Department, and I have nothing more to add on that question.

The Auditor-General has entirely missed the 22nd Section of 17 Vict. No. 4, so far as it relates to the Fees included in the Schedule mentioned therein.

THE Chief Secretary is of opinion that the decision of Parliament, as arrived at by Resolution assented to by both branches of the Legislature, cannot be disregarded and set aside by a division upon a subsequent Resolution introduced by a private Member, and taken only in one branch of the Legislature.

The Chief Secretary is of opinion that the Legislative Council would not rescind the existing Resolution that the Accounts of the Curator of Intestate Estates should be audited by the Audit Department; and with such a Parliamentary record before him, the Auditor-General is only doing his duty in keeping alive the subject until Parliamentary instructions be repealed.

The Chief Secretary cannot, under the circumstances named by the Hon. the Attorney-General, put the further strain upon that Department to prepare for this Session the amended legislation necessary, but thinks it desirable that such amended legislation should be prepared in the recess.

It has not been shown that their Honors the Judges would object to a proper audit of the Curator's accounts before submission for final certificates, as suggested in the Auditor's letter of 31st August, 1887 (see Parl. Paper No. 119 of 1887); and this course seems so reasonable, and calculated to save trouble, that it is difficult to understand what possible objection can be raised against it.

The Auditor also wishes respectfully to add that it has not been shown that their Honors the Judges desire to resist the evident wishes of Parliament in this matter; and, with due deference to the legal objections expressed in the correspondence, ventures to be of opinion that an arrangement could be made for an audit in conformity with the wishes of Parliament if the subject be met in a proper spirit by all parties concerned, without the necessity for any alteration to the present law.

The Auditor-General will have observed that on 6th February last I advised that there was no fund available out of which this amount could be paid, and that I deprecated obtaining an Executive Minute authorising the amount to be placed upon a Supplementary Estimate, but I was then under the impression that the Brighton Rabbit Board were at fault in the matter. Since then the Crown Solicitor has investigated the case, and places such facts before me as have convinced me that the Government ought to pay the amount, and I have always interpreted the 19th Section of the 2nd Schedule to "The Audit Act" as embracing all unforeseen and exceptional claims upon the Government which the Governor in Council recognise as valid and such as ought in justice and equity to be paid out of the General Revenue. If this claim is one that ought in equity and good conscience to be paid by the Government, I cannot see why it should await Parliamentary sanction any more than the vast majority of sums that are paid upon the authority of the 19th Section of the 2nd Schedule.

No. 43, Schedule 1, Section 20, and shall be glad if the Hon. the Attorney-General will cause me to be advised as to what is legally required of the Auditor-General before payments can be made by the Treasury under authority of the Governor in Council. Is the Auditor-General required to do more than report the fact that any particular payment has been duly authorised in the manner prescribed, or is his report to enter into a discussion on the authority of the Governor in Council, and call it in question, and thereby set it aside by declining to supply the Treasury with report of that fact that the authority of the Governor in Council has been given?

AUDIT ACT, 1888, Schedule 2, Clause 20 (52 Vict. No. 43).

Opinion on Memorandum of the Honorable the Treasurer, dated 18.10.89.

I PRESUME that Schedule 2, Clause 20 of 52 Vict. No. 43 is referred to.

In my opinion, the Auditor, under the above Clause, is merely required to report the fact that a particular payment has been duly authorised in the manner prescribed, and he has no power to enter into a discussion as to whether the Governor in Council exercised a proper discretion in the matter, nor has he any right to decline to make a report that the expenditure has been duly authorised, if, as a matter of fact, the expenditure has been authorised by the Governor in Council. Clauses 19 and 20 of the Schedule are not well drafted, but I think the meaning is sufficiently clear.

Clause 19 provides that it shall not be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise any expenditure of public money for purposes not provided by Parliament unless in cases of emergency or excesses in the details of Establishments. This clause recognises the fact that though, as a rule, no expenditure of public money can be made which is not authorised by Parliament, yet there are unforeseen cases in which it is expedient that money should be paid. The Governor in Council takes the whole responsibility of deciding such cases, and of course Ministers are responsible to Parliament for their advice on such matters. I do not think it can be intended that in each case Ministers are to take the Auditor into their counsels, or that it is necessary that the Auditor should authorise the expenditure; and if this is so the Auditor has no power to approve or disapprove of the exercise of discretion in any particular case by the Governor in Council. If the Auditor has power to disallow any expenditure authorised by the Governor in Council, then the power given to the Governor in Council is nugatory.

Considering that the above sections find a place in the Audit Act itself, it appears to me that the sections would have been differently worded had the Legislature intended to allow the Auditor to interfere with the discretion of the Governor in Council.

This view is strengthened by Clause 20, which provides that in any case of excess in expenditure under the authority, &c., intimation shall be made to the Auditor of such authority having been granted, and the effect thereof, and the Treasurer is not to make any payment under the authority without the previous report of the Auditor that the payment has been duly authorised. This clause is merely to make it certain that the authority has in fact been granted, and to prevent the Treasurer from paying until he has received the report of the Auditor that the payment has been duly authorised.

The authority and the effect of it is merely intimated to the Auditor, and that is sufficient. There is no power given to the Auditor to go behind the authority and call it in question, and, indeed, there is no machinery to enable him to do so. He cannot, for instance, in case of some emergency call for persons and papers to enquire into the expediency of the expenditure, and act as if he were a member of the Governor's Council. The words "duly authorised" merely mean that the authority has been duly given, not that the Governor in Council has exercised a due and proper discretion.

It may be doubted whether the words in Clause 20—"In case of any excess in expenditure"—apply to cases of emergency as well as to excesses in details. If they do not so apply then the Treasurer may make payments in cases of emergency without any report at all from the Auditor. I incline to the opinion, however, that the above words do apply to cases of emergency, and that the Treasurer must therefore have the Auditor's report in such cases; but, as above pointed out, the Auditor has no discretion in the matter, and must give the report if the Governor in Council has authorised the expenditure.

The Auditor-General has the honor to acknowledge receipt of the joint opinion of the Honorable the Attorney-General and the Solicitor-General as to the construction and meaning of Clause 20 of Schedule 2 of the Audit Act, 52 Vict. No. 43, forwarded by the Honorable the Treasurer.

The opinion now forwarded is substantially of the same effect as that given by the Honorable Alfred Dobson, as Attorney-General, on 7th March, 1878, to which the Auditor replied on 13th March, 1878, and the whole correspondence on the subject is published in House of Assembly Paper, No. 38, of Session 1878, pages 29 and 30.

As the Auditor's opinion then given has not altered since, it will be unnecessary that he should do more in referring to this matter than to say that he is prepared to report in any case that has been approved by the Governor in Council, but reserves to himself the right to point out in any such report any circumstance that may come under his notice which appears to him to be irregular, or in which expenditure appears to him to have been authorised contrary to the intention and meaning of the Audit Act.

The essence and meaning of clauses 19 and 20 of Schedule 2 are that certain descriptions of expenditure shall be subject to pre-audit; if, therefore, the Auditor has not the power in the case of such expenditure to do that which he undoubtedly has in expenditure previously authorised by Parliament, he would be placed in the position of a mere machine, and compelled to certify contrary to his conscience and common sense. This is a position which he cannot believe Parliament intended to place him in: he is therefore unable to act in the restricted sense which the joint opinion appears to him to place upon the meaning of the clause referred to, unless this duty in such cases shall be clearly so defined by law.

PERUSED and returned. I only desire to add, that I have construed the Schedule according to the words enacted. It is dangerous to speculate upon what the *intention* of the Legislature was if that intention is not expressed in the Act.

ALFRED DOBSON. 1st November, 1889.

I no not understand what the Auditor-General means by the word "pre-audit," and I am of opinion that the word is improperly used in connection with payments made upon the authority of the Governor in Council without the previous sanction of Parliament.

The statutory functions of the Auditor-General in respect of the expenditure of moneys voted by Parliament is from time to time to ascertain whether the sums included in the Treasurer's Monthly Statement are legally available for the services or purposes mentioned in such statement, (52 Vict. No. 43, Sec. 10), and thereupon to prepare a form of Warrant in accordance with the Schedule to the Audit Act for signature by the Governor authorising payment of those sums; subsequently the Auditor is to examine all vouchers, accounts, &c. furnished to him by the Treasurer as required by the Audit Act, and to give the Treasurer an acquittance for so much money as he has ascertained to have been duly and properly expended, (Sec. 3), and to surcharge the Treasurer with any money which appears to have been applied to any service or purpose for which the same was not legally available.

I think that it must be evident that nothing of this kind can be done in respect of moneys expended upon the authority of the Governor in Council without the sanction of Parliament, because such moneys are not "legally available" within the meaning of those words as used in the Audit Act for the purpose to which they are applied, and if there was not any provision for cases of emergency, the Auditor-General would have to surcharge the Treasurer with all such moneys.

But the provisions relating to emergencies exempt the Treasurer from the liability of being surcharged with such sums, and therefore places them in a totally different category from that in which moneys voted by Parliament are placed by the Audit Act. Hence I am of opinion that any attempt on the part of the Auditor-General to exercise any such supervision or control over their expenditure as that which he is undoubtedly invested by the Audit Act in regard to moneys voted by Parliament is unwarranted, and that there cannot be anything that can be called a "pre-audit" in regard to them.

Before proceeding with this correspondence the Auditor wishes to explain that he used the words "pre-audit" in the commonly accepted meaning, viz. "audit before payment," and regrets this was not made sufficiently clear to the Honorable the Attorney-General in his previous remarks.

The argument of the Law Officers with regard to expenditure authorised by the Governor in Council not previously provided by Parliament appears to be that the Auditor has no right to exercise any scrutiny or to raise a question in any way with reference to such expenditure, and that his duty in any case submitted to him, in accordance with Clause 20, Schedule 2, of the Audit Act, is simply to report that the expenditure has been duly authorised; but, recognising that "it is dangerous to speculate what the intention of the Legislature was if such intention is not expressed in the Act," the Auditor is compelled with respect to this matter to look in the section referred to for any words that can possibly mean that his duty in such cases is defined in the manner stated, and he is unable to discover any such meaning. On the other hand, the law evidently requires that any authority for such expenditure must be intimated to the Auditor, and that payment cannot be made without his previous report, and evidently it is not compulsory upon him to report unless, in his opinion, the payment has been duly authorised; he can only, therefore, express regret that his opinion does not coincide with the Law Officers, the more so because he feels that if he could consistently agree with that opinion he would be relieved of a most disagreeable duty.

The matter is so important that it seems desirable to refer the question to Parliament during the present session, in order that the doubts now existing may be made clear by legislation; but if this is not thought to be desirable by the Government, the Auditor hopes that his duty in respect thereto will be clearly defined by an amendment of the Audit Act, or by Resolution of both Houses of Parliament, as soon as may be.

The Auditor-General is perfectly correct in his statement of the provisions of the Audit Act when he says, "the law evidently requires that any authority for such expenditure must be intimated to the Auditor, and that payment cannot be made without his previous report, and evidently it is not compulsory upon him to report, unless, in his opinion, the payment has been duly authorised." But the Auditor appears to me to misread the reference contained in the words "duly authorised." Those words refer to the Governor in Council, and the Auditor has the right to enquire whether any payment professedly authorised by the Governor in Council under Regulations 19 and 20 has been actually authorised in due form thereunder; but he is not empowered to review the action of the Governor in Council, and to decide whether they have acted improperly or not in so authorising any such payment: that is the function and prerogative of Parliament, and Ministers are responsible to Parliament only for any advice they give the Governor in such cases.

If the explanation of the Honorable the Attorney-General is correct, the reference to the Auditor required by the Act would be meaningless and unnecessary, because the fact of the authority of the Governor in Council having been given would be in the hands of the Treasurer, and there would be no necessity to seek for the Auditor's Report unless something more was intended than a mere formal report of such a fact.

The Honorable the Attorney-General admits that the Auditor has the power to review expenditure previously voted by Parliament after it has been authorised by the Governor in Council, and says that in the case of expenditure not previously authorised by Parliament he has no such power; but it appears to the Auditor inconceivable that the Legislature, in requiring that the Auditor's Report shall be necessary in the latter case before any payment can be made, should not have intended to provide some safeguard against improper expenditure. Certainly there is no proof that the law compels the Auditor to report without consideration that every case of expenditure not previously recognised by Parliament has been duly authorised because it has received the assent of the Governor in Council. He feels, therefore, that he cannot, consistently with his duty, retire from the position he has taken up in this matter.

The assertion of the Auditor-General that upon my interpretation of the words "duly authorised" the reference to the Auditor in Regulations 19 and 20 is meaningless, is a non sequitur. The Legislature may have had many good reasons for requiring the Auditor to report to the Treasurer in such cases. But there is nothing to gain by surrounding this question with a cloud of words and side issues. The whole matter to be decided is whether or not the Auditor-General is empowered to review the action of the Governor in Council and to anticipate the judgment of Parliament upon any advice which His Excellency's

responsible Ministers may tender to him. I have no hesitation in saying that there is not the slightest indication in "The Audit Act," or in any other Statute, that the Legislature intended to introduce such a radical change in Constitutional law and usage, and to transfer a portion of its own prerogative and functions to any officer of the Civil Service.
