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

To the Honorable the Speaker and the Members of the House of Assembly of Tasmania.

That your Petitioners, being interested in Orchards, have had their attention called to the "Bill to provide for the Destruction of the Codlin Moth."

That upon mature consideration they do not think it will effect its purpose, while it will make the possession of fruit trees expensive, troublesome, and vexatious, and render them less valuable than they are at present notwithstanding the ravages of the grub.

That your Petitioners earnestly hope that your Honorable House will not pass the Bill.
