REPORT of the BOARD OF EDUCATION for the Year 1874.

To His Excellency FREDERICK ALOYSIUS WELD, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

1. WE, the Members of the Board of Education, Tasmania, have the honor to submit the following Report of our proceedings during the past year.

2. During the year 1873 there were 141 Schools in actual operation. The total number of distinct children at any time on the Rolls for that year was 10,803; the average number on the Rolls from month to month was 7047; the average daily attendance was 5268. During the year 1874 there were 147 Schools in operation; the total number of distinct children on the Rolls for the year was 12,158; the average number on the Rolls from month to month was 7970, and the average daily attendance 5867.

As compared with the year 1873 the number of Schools has increased by six; the total number of children on the Rolls by 1355; the average number on the Rolls by 923; and the average daily attendance by 495.

3. *Progress of Schools.*—The progress of the Schools conducted in connection with the Board since the establishment of the present system of Public Instruction is shown in the following Table:—

The amount granted by the Board, as shown above, is chargeable against Loans Bill. In addition to the sums expended or appropriated as above, we have paid £483 7s. 2d. out of the "Vote in aid of Public Schools" for repairs and improvements to School-houses.

8. *Schools opened*—Schools at the following places were established during the year:—Duck River, Ecclestone, George's Bay and Gould's Country (half time Schools), Port Arthur, Queen's Asylum and River Plenty: one School was re-opened after having been temporarily closed; viz., Mount Seymour.

9. *Grant for Education*.—The total expenditure out of the "Vote in aid of Public Schools" amounted to £13,225 19s 11d. The appropriation of this money is exhibited in detail in Appendix A. and E., and may be briefly recapitulated as follows:—

14. *General and Local Inspection.*—On summarising Appendix G. it will be seen that 4153 visits have been made to the Public Schools during the year, of which 122 were made by the Inspector; 1635 by Members of the Local Boards, and 1225 by other persons; and, for the purpose of imparting Religious Instruction, 949 visits were made by Ministers of Church of England, 150 by Ministers of Church of Rome, 44 by Ministers of Church of Scotland, 23 by Wesleyan Ministers, 1 by a Minister of the Independent Church, and 4 by Ministers of other Denominations.

15. *Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.*—In the month of June we caused an Examination for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools to be held; twelve Candidates presented themselves; and on the recommendation of the Examiners, the Revs. Arthur Davenport, B.A., and Francis Hudspeth, M.A., we awarded an exhibition of the value of £16 13s. 4d. per annum, tenable for four years from the 1st July, 1874, to each of the under-mentioned Candidates:—

Allan John Baxter, age 11 years and 11 months, Public School, Hagley.

Percy Rout, age 11 years and 3 months, Public School, Bathurst-street, Hobart Town.

George Benson Boyes, age 11 years and 9 months, Public Schools, New Town and Trinity Hill, Hobart Town.

William James Rule, age 11 years and 9 months, Public School, Battery Point, Hobart Town.

George Irwin Totham, age 11 years and 5 months, Public School, Battery Point, Hobart Town.

William Percy Hood, age 11 years and 5 months, Public School, Battery Point, Hobart Town.

The Examiners in closing their Report observe—

“The number of candidates was smaller than in previous years. Heretofore boys under thirteen years have been invited to compete for the Exhibitions. Only boys under twelve years are now admitted to the Examination, and the change has evidently reduced the number of candidates, especially in the first year of its operation. We did not, however, deem it necessary to set easier papers than before, and we are gratified to find that the attainments of the boys who have won the Exhibitions, and of the candidates generally, compare favourably with former Examinations. The number of marks obtained by the foremost in the race, and the average number gained by the successful candidates, are larger than they were last year, or any previous year, except at the Examination of 1872. Only one boy failed to attain the standard qualifying a candidate for a place in the Table annexed to the Report, and nine out of the twelve examined reached the standard of qualification for an Exhibition. It is a feature of this Examination that the boy who has distinguished himself most belongs to a country school, and not, as heretofore, to one of the schools at Hobart Town or Launceston.”

A Statement of the Expenditure under this head will be found in Appendix C.

16. *Furieux Group*.—From the Returns furnished by Mr. Henry Collis, the Schoolmaster for the children on the Islands comprising Furieux Group, it is shown that there are 43 pupils under instruction—21 males and 22 females—who have attended on an average 119 days each. Schools are conducted by the Master assisted by his wife, the Mistress, on the following Islands; viz., Badger Island, 16 children; Cape Barren Island, 30 children; Chappell Island, 18 children. Many of the children attend two or more of the Schools. Twenty-six visits were made to these Schools during the year, three by Members of the Local School Board, two by a Minister of Church of England, and twenty-one by other persons. The standard of Instruction reaches Class III, and the average age of the pupils is returned as eleven years.

APPENDIX I.

GENERAL Report for 1874, by T. STEPHENS, Esq., M.A., Chief Inspector of Schools.

Hobart Town, 17th May, 1875.

GENTLEMEN,

I HAVE the honour to present my General Report for the year ended 31st December, 1874.

The following statement is extracted from my diary of work performed during the year :—

It seldom happens that any one day is exclusively devoted to a particular kind of business. A portion of the intervals between tours of inspection is occasionally taken up with the revision and correction of exercises worked at recent school examinations, and the correspondence with Teachers upon matters connected with the organisation and instruction of their schools comes under the same head. The above table, however, gives a tolerably exact outline of the distribution of my time.

The number of separate schools visited during the year was 90, of which 21 were visited twice or oftener. The total number of visits was 122, including a few paid to schools which were temporarily closed on the day fixed for the inspection, but excluding visits paid after school hours, or for other purposes. The distance travelled during the year was 3024 miles, counting only the distances from point to point of the day's journey. The accomplishment of the year's work, partial and incomplete as it is, has again entailed upon me much extra labour and extra expense which I cannot undertake to continue. The duties connected with a thorough system of inspection and supervision of schools scattered over so extensive an area as the whole of Tasmania would give full employment to three Inspectors.

At the beginning of the year my plans were laid, as heretofore, for visiting every district, and for inspecting or examining as many schools as possible in each; but the calls of special business which could not be anticipated, and the necessity of re-visiting distant localities, repeatedly upset my arrangements. Nearly the whole of the time available for the rural districts was given to testing the standard of proficiency by means of the plan of individual examination which I introduced several years ago under the sanction of the Board, and which has at least tended to discourage the exclusive attention to one or two classes, and to one or two pet subjects, which was formerly very prevalent. A thorough examination under the programme of instruction occupies from two hours in a small school to about five days in a large school. The children are not "presented" under particular standards, at the Teacher's discretion: they are examined as classified by him in accordance with standing rules and instructions, and the exceptional cases which occasionally require him to deviate a little from those instructions are judged upon their merits by the Inspector. Every child is examined under the standard of work prescribed for his class in the various subjects of instruction, and the degree of proficiency exhibited is carefully noted. In the higher classes a portion of the examination is always conducted on paper, the questions being either printed, or dictated by the Inspector, and the exercises are preserved for future reference and comparison. These examinations have their disadvantages when there is no adequate staff of Inspectors. They consume too much time in proportion to their importance; they give no opportunity for observing the School in its ordinary working condition; they leave no leisure for noticing faulty methods of instruction, or defects in School-management, nor for their correction; and they tend to encourage the neglect of those higher aims which distinguish *education* in the proper sense of the term, from the *instruction* with which it is too often confounded.

The number of children whose proficiency was tested, more or less completely, was about 2570, including one or more classes in Schools which were not fully examined in detail. Omitting all exceptional cases, where either the attendance was below the average or the examination incomplete, I have carefully tabulated the results obtained in 50 rural schools comprising 1806 scholars. Of the general results it is enough to remark that out of 1806 children I found 898 not advanced beyond the standard of the 1st or lowest class, and only 186 (half of whom were supplied by 8 schools) fit for the 4th and higher classes. It is necessary to call attention to these salient facts, but I do not care to lay stress on numerical statements of "passes" and "failures," which afford no means of doing justice to the deserts of good Teachers; nor am I justified in dwelling upon the unsatisfactory results obtained in many Schools, while I see that a low standard of efficiency in instruction, as well as in other matters of higher importance, is less chargeable to the demerits of Teachers than to imperfections in the System under which they work. The particulars of each School examination have already been laid before the Board in my separate Reports, and it will perhaps have been remarked that two of the most unsatisfactory Schools were under the management of ex-Pupil Teachers who had successfully passed the prescribed examinations. I only cite these instances because they furnish, from a quarter in which it might not be expected, additional evidence to show that the mere fact of the attainment of a satisfactory standard of scholarship is not to be taken as a proof of competency in the profession of Teacher.

The following general remarks on the elementary instruction are based upon what has been noted in all the Schools which I have visited:—Reading is the subject in which the greatest number of passes is always obtained, partly because it is the chief basis of classification, and partly because the standard is necessarily low. In the majority of Schools it is not possible to require more than that the words of previous lessons shall be known at sight, and read with tolerable fluency. There are a few highly creditable exceptions, which demonstrate the possibility of securing proper emphasis and expression, combined with an intelligent knowledge of the subject. The Irish Series of Reading Books is unsuitable in many respects, especially for Australian Schools; but no satisfactory substitute has yet been found. Writing, both on slates and paper, is admirably taught in some of the Schools, and passably in most, the best results being usually found under those Teachers who make regular use of the earlier numbers of Vere Foster's and Darnell's books; but excellence in this branch depends mainly upon the careful supervision of the work in its most elementary stages. The failures which are recorded under this heading are chiefly caused by bad spelling, and this is generally the result of unskilful instruction. Both Writing and Spelling are tested, except in the lowest classes, by exercises written to dictation, and they may be said to be, on the whole, in a fairly satisfactory condition. This is the only branch in which a decided general improvement can be observed in a ten years' retrospect. Arithmetic is the subject in which the greatest number of failures occur, and it may be well to state what is required in each class. In Class I, all children are "passed" who can write down the figures 1 to 10 from memory. In Class II, a very easy sum in Simple Addition, with notation to three places of figures, is the test. In Class III, all children are "passed" who can work correctly any one sum in the Simple Rules out of four or five printed on a card, written on the black-board, or dictated. In Class IV, beyond which the instruction does not usually proceed in country Schools, they are examined in a similar manner in the Compound Rules. To work correctly some such easy sum as the following secures a "pass":—"A man with £1500 paid £606 13s. 4d. to one creditor, and £391 7s. 9d. to another. How much had he left?" Classes V and VI are seldom represented except in the large town Schools. They are first required to show a satisfactory knowledge of the elements of Arithmetic, and are then examined in the work which belongs more especially to their respective grades. It is impossible to give any general statement of the efficiency in this branch of instruction; the extremes of good and bad teaching, and every intermediate stage, are all represented. Credit is always given, in all classes, for work which goes beyond the *minimum* requirements in each subject of instruction.

The "other subjects" of the programme of instruction are limited in most Schools to English Grammar and Geography. Fair proficiency is often exhibited in the rudiments of these subjects, and in a few of the better Schools the teaching goes quite as far as is desirable. What I endeavour to impress upon Teachers is that the dry technicalities of the ordinary text-books are of very little use to children who must leave School before they have learnt their application, and that unless they can throw such life into their teaching as will develop ideas in the minds of their scholars, and lead them to think and reason for themselves they are only wasting their time. Parsing and analysis are useful exercises if attention be directed rather to illustration of the notions represented by words, and of their relations to one another and to the whole sentence, than to the elaborate rules and definitions, and the metaphysical abstractions, with which many modern text books on Grammar are overloaded. These, of course, have their proper place, but that is not in Schools which have to do the whole work of education between the ages of 5 and 12 years, with more or less irregularity of attendance. The same remarks are also to a certain extent applicable to Geography. Maps and the black-board are the medium, and oral teaching the method to be chiefly used; but this art is unfortunately a very general *desideratum*. The geography of Australia is somewhat better known than it was a few years ago: that of Tasmania is still seldom taught with any satisfactory result. English History is expected to be included in the course of instruction where the higher classes are organised. The text-books accessible to Teachers are somewhat open to objection on account of a slight sectarian bias, which is almost inseparable from this subject; but as they are not required to be used as class reading books, but only for home study, this objection is not of much consequence. One of the best that I have seen is a little work by Dr. Collier, which is well adapted for use as an introductory text book. Object Lessons, though prescribed for each class as a part of the regular course, are little understood or employed by Public School Teachers, with a few creditable exceptions. The term is primarily applied, in the profession, to oral lessons upon material objects of use or interest; but it also includes all lessons given without book to large classes, or groups of classes, which are based on the principles and practice of inductive teaching, and there is no more valuable agency for developing intelligence, and giving life to the dry routine of ordinary School work. Under the name of Religious Instruction, lessons in Scripture History are usually given by the Head Teachers during the first half-hour of morning School, and it is very much to their credit that no imputation of any departure from the limits of unsectarian instruction has ever been charged against them. I have regretted to find that some Teachers are under the impression that the Board desires to discourage this branch of instruction. Plain needle-work is taught very satisfactorily in almost every School which is under the charge of a married Teacher, and in some of the others.

Having had few opportunities of inspecting the Schools in their ordinary working condition, I am not in a position to make any general report on the specific causes of defective instruction, on the standard of discipline, and other details of general management, or on the faithful observance of rules and instructions. I know that in some cases the teaching and management are excellent, and I believe that almost all Teachers are interested in their work, and anxious to do their best. Only those who are in the habit of visiting the outlying bush settlements at all seasons of the year can form any adequate conception of the local difficulties which impede the labours of many Teachers. Their task is no easy one, but the excellent condition of management and instruction produced, in the most trying circumstances, by some who have had no training except what they have received from myself prove that the standard of efficiency which I desire to see universal is not unreasonably high. One fruitful cause of inefficiency is the irregularity of attendance, and for this the operation of the Free Scholar System is very frequently responsible, though it is

sometimes attributable to a want of energy and ability in the Teacher. Some special provision for destitute children may be necessary; but the two distinct classes of parents are rather those who *will*, and *will not*, than those who *can*, and *cannot* pay School fees. The following extract from a recent speech of Sir Charles Reed's, Chairman of the London School Board, is worthy of attention:—

“The London School Board have no Free Schools. 8400 children came over to us as Ragged School children. They had never been in the habit of paying a fee. * * The ratepayers are heavily charged for the difference between the cost of the education, and the fees the parents pay; but to accomplish our work we must at first have a low fee. It is the desire and the intention of the Board, I believe, to raise these fees as soon as it is possible to do it; but I do think I may say that the problem has been solved that the parents do not need free education. *We expect them to pay, and they do so because we expect them; if we did not expect the fee no doubt we should find it difficult to get it.*”

I need not now add much to the remarks which I have annually made on the importance of providing for a regular supply of competent Teachers. The increasing unwillingness of suitable persons to enter the service, and the consequent difficulty experienced in filling vacancies in country Schools, arise from causes which are removable; while the objection to the employment of untrained Teachers may be partially removed by the appointment of additional Inspectors, and the adoption of some such plan as was suggested in my special report of the 3rd July, 1872. Nothing can supersede the necessity of making some provision for the systematic training of Teachers in the business of their profession, but this will, at best, only provide for a *future* supply of competent Teachers, and will not meet the present urgent need of educational improvement.

Many individual members of the Local School Boards have rendered valuable service during the year in promoting the attendance of neglected children, with or without enforcement of the compulsory clauses of the Act. The results of compulsion are not always satisfactory. There is a large apparent increase in the number of children, but it will be observed that the increase is chiefly in the number on Rolls, and not in the average daily attendance, the meaning of which is that the attendance of children is even more irregular than it used to be. In Launceston and Hobart Town there is a perceptible increase; but in the latter case it is chiefly owing to the re-opening of one School, and the re-establishment of another on a footing of efficiency. This is, however, irrespective of the effect which may have been produced upon the Ragged Schools through the operation of the Act. In seven of the Electoral Districts there is a slight diminution, and the increase in some of the others is attributable to the opening of additional Schools, and the operation of ordinary causes. In connection with this subject I feel it my duty to call attention to one point which has been somewhat overlooked—the necessity of providing proper accommodation and efficient instruction for those to whom it is desired to extend the benefits of education. A Teacher who is only competent to manage and teach a small number of children, or whose available accommodation is already occupied, can render very little service to the class of irregular scholars who require compulsion, and their admission under such circumstances is a positive injury to those who attend regularly. As a practical illustration is of more value than mere argument, I will give a case in point. The Sassafras School in East Devon *nominally* provides accommodation for 43 children, but in consequence of the exceedingly bad planning of the schoolroom it is only fit for about 30. Though the floor space is so encumbered by the necessary furniture that proper class-teaching is out of the question, there is only desk room for 38 children. On the day of my inspection there were 34 boys and 32 girls, or 66 in all, present. The number attending with more or less regularity during the previous month was 81, and on one occasion during the year there were actually 91 present. Looking to the annual results, I find the total number on the Rolls to have been 137. Of these only 8 attended over 200 days, while 83 attended less than 50 days. Only 22 attended with tolerable regularity during the year, and some of these were absent for three months at a time. The School is under the management of a qualified and zealous Teacher, who is in no way responsible for these deplorable results. This is not an isolated case, though it is the worst that has come under my observation, and it could hardly be surpassed. What effect such a state of things, or one approximating to it, must have upon a conscientious Teacher, and how hopeless must be his task, may be readily imagined, though the evil consequences can only be thoroughly realised by those who have had practical experience in schools. I am well aware of the earnest consideration which has been given by the Board to the whole question of compulsory education, and I am only anxious to show the necessity of regarding it from every point of view, and of providing competent surveillance over the enforcement of the compulsory clauses. So far as regards legislation upon the subject, the provisions of the Act are, I think, sufficiently ample and explicit; the rest must be effected by the agency of the Department itself, and not the least important of the means for attaining the object in view is the establishment and maintenance of efficient schools.
