

NEW TOWN CHARITABLE INSTITUTION FOR MALES:

REPORT FOR 1879.

ANNUAL REPORT of the New Town Charitable Institution for Males for the Half-year ending 31st December, 1879.

SIR.

I HAVE the honor to submit the first Report of the New Town Charitable Institution for Males for the Half-year ending 31st December, 1879.

This Institution was opened for the reception of Male Invalids on the 1st July, 1879,—one hundred and eight men being transferred from the Cascades Invalid Depôt, the remaining Inmates of the Cascades being forwarded during the month; so that on the 31st July all the Invalids (with the exception of ten men left to assist in taking in the crops and performing other necessary works at the Hospital for Insane), numbering three hundred and thirty-five from the Cascades, were admitted into this Institution. One hundred and sixteen Invalids were also received from the Brickfields Invalid Depôt.

I have, during the half-year, been most particular in placing every man upon admission before the Medical Officer, in order to ascertain their capabilities for work, so as to utilise their labour as far as possible. All classified for light labour and refusing to work have at once been ejected from the nst itution.

Twenty men are stationed at the New Town Cemetery, to assist in keeping the grounds clean and to perform other such light labour. Thirteen are also located at the New Town Farm,—being employed as milkmen, farm labourers, &c. The others remaining in the Institution who have been classified by the Medical Officer for light work have been kept constantly employed, all tradesmen being worked at their trades as far as possible.

The health of the Inmates, considering that the majority are aged and have led very hard and dissolute lives, may be favourably compared with other Charitable Establishments; and the death-rate, viz., thirty during the six months, will not excite surprise when it is borne in mind that the average age of deceased Inmates is over 73 years.

The conduct of the Inmates as a whole does not admit of any special complaint. Of course there are many malcontents; but, generally speaking, mildness and firmness have kept them in order. Much inconvenience, however, is felt in the management, owing to the want of approved Rules for the guidance of the officers and men.

Great want is experienced—and as the winter season sets in the want will be severely felt—of suitable Day-room accommodation, to protect the Inmates from wet and cold. Last winter the absence of these requirements was painfully apparent.

The spiritual welfare of the Inmates has been well attended to by Ministers of Religion and others,—ladies and laymen frequently visiting during the week-days, and also on Sundays.

The conduct of the officers, limited as they are in number, deserves the highest commendation. The duties and all instructions have been cheerfully and efficiently carried out.
