10 Ms White to move—That:—

- (1) A Select Committee be appointed, with power to send for persons, papers and records, to inquire into and report upon the Tasmania Government's dealings with Tasmania Basketball Pty Ltd and any other associated entities from 27 August 2020 onwards, including but not limited to:—
 - (a) whether former Minister for Sport and Recreation, the Hon. Jane Howlett MLC's relationship with Tasmania Basketball Pty Ltd's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Simon Brookhouse, constituted a conflict of interest under the Ministerial Code of Conduct;
 - (b) former Premier Peter Gutwein and his office's involvement in managing Ms Howlett's alleged conflict of interest and her departure from the Ministry;
 - (c) Ms Howlett's involvement in decisions relating to Tasmanian Government support for Tasmania Basketball Pty Ltd; and
 - (d) any other matters incidental thereto.
- (2) Members to serve on the Committee be:—
 - (a) three from the Government, nominated by the Leader of the House;
 - (b) two from the Opposition, nominated by the Leader of Opposition Business;
 - (c) one from the Greens, nominated by Ms O'Connor.
- (3) The Committee report by 29 July 2022. (24 May 2022)

11 Ms Dow to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) Tasmania has the worst ambulance response times in the country;
 - (b) these response times have blown out by 30% under the Liberal Government.
 - (c) sadly Tasmanians are dying whilst waiting for an ambulance; and
 - (d) a Hobart man in his late 70s died after waiting four hours and 15 minutes for an ambulance and an elderly man in the State's North died after waiting seven hours for an ambulance.
- (2) Acknowledges that:—
 - (a) a resilience scan of Ambulance Tasmania staff showed an extraordinary number of staff are suffering mental health conditions and self-medicating;
 - (b) Paramedics in this country have one of the highest rates of suicide of any profession;
 - (c) three years ago a Senate Inquiry into the mental health of first responders released 15 recommendations, to date one has been implemented by the Tasmanian Government and none by the Federal Government; and
 - (d) Paramedics and volunteer ambulance officers in Tasmania are under unprecedented pressure – with regularly unfilled shifts, fatigue alerts and a lack of resources.

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- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP, to provide increased funding in the 2022 Budget to ensure our Paramedics and volunteers are given better resources and mental health support and to fix ambulance ramping across the State. (24 May 2022)

12 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Meander Valley Council celebrated its Australia Day Award recipients at the end of March 2022 with recognising community contribution, leadership and voluntary service. Although the celebration was held later in 2022 due to COVID-19, the celebration of these outstanding citizens was in no way diminished.
- (2) Congratulates the following participants:—
 - (a) Laura Richardson of Deloraine, awarded Citizen of the Year. This award is particularly poignant for me as Laura was my adviser for a number of years in the primary industries space and I know firsthand of her wonderful contribution to her local community in various capacities, including rural youth groups, Meander Valley Financial Services, Deloraine Amateur Basketball and Netball Clubs and many more. Congratulation to Laura;
 - (b) Luke Cole, awarded the Young Citizen of the Year Award. Luke is a member of Pearn's Steam World, undertaking restoration of key pieces of Pearn's collection. Luke also volunteers at Deloraine House in various capacities. Congratulation Luke;
 - (c) Renee Walker awarded the Sports Award. Renee volunteers with Deloraine Football Club, is a Junior Development Officer, coaching two junior girls teams and her advocacy for equal opportunity and inclusiveness has been paramount. Congratulations Renee.
- (3) Further Notes that Chudleigh's Australia Day Breakfast won Community Event of the Year.
- (4) Thanks the many volunteers included. (25 May 2022)

13 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) that the National Canoe Slalom Championships took place at Bradys Lake in the Central Highlands, 22-24 April 2022; and
 - (b) that the Bradys Slalom Course is managed by the Derwent Canoe Club in conjunction with Hydro Tasmania. It runs between two bodies of water, Bronte Lagoon and Bradys Lake, which are part of the chain of lakes created to supply Tungatinah Power Station.
- (2) Recognises that Hydro Tasmania worked closely with the event organisers to coordinate water releases over the duration of the event and that Hydro Tasmania released 18 cumecs of water, or 18 tonnes per second, through the course for the duration of the competition.
- (3) Further notes that Bradys Lake is Australia's top natural channel slalom course and one of the few in the world where a water authority works closely with a community canoeing club to hold competitions.
- (4) Congratulates all athletes that competed at the championships, with more than 100 paddlers from around the country entering the event.
- (5) Congratulates Tasmania's own and Tokyo Olympian Daniel Watkins, for successfully defending his MC1 title and claiming bronze in the MK1 event. Daniel has been paddling with the Derwent Valley Canoe Club since 2007.
- (6) Congratulates event organisers, volunteers, officials and Hydro Tasmania for a successful event. (25 May 2022)
