Notices of Motion

337 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Celebrates the opening of the new St. Vincent de Paul Society Community Hub, located in Boland Street Launceston, on 21 August 2020 which was blessed by Father Mark Freeman.
- (2) Acknowledges the efforts in bringing the hub to life, which started as an idea at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic in response to the number of people requiring support during this difficult period.
- (3) Notes the Hub will provide a one stop service which includes financial literacy assistance, homelessness and family violence support.
- (4) Further notes that the Hub will also support people who are accessing Centrelink services and offers one-on-one engagement for conversations that they may find challenging.
- (5) Recognises the Hub is also designed to be used by other community groups, service organisations, charities, and numerous youth-oriented groups.
- (6) Commends the work of Chief Executive Lara Alexander, State President Mark Gaetani and Northern Regional President Vyvian Allchin and thanks them for their role in delivering this important service to Northern Tasmania.
- (7) Further recognises the significant contribution of St Vincent de Paul members, staff and the many volunteers, without which the support and services to be provided through the Hub would not be possible.
- (8) Encourages anyone in need to reach out to the Vinnies Community Hub to speak to the volunteers who can provide the support and assistance they require. (27 August 2020)

338 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Cancer Council's Daffodil Day for 2020 is being held on 28 August 2020.
- (2) Notes that the Daffodil Day Appeal is one of the Cancer Council's most iconic campaigns, raising more than \$56,000 in 2019 through the sale of fresh daffodils, daffodil pins and merchandise.
- (3) Further acknowledges that the Cancer Council has adopted a new approach for the 2020 fundraising appeal, with Tasmanians being encouraged to get crafty and create yellow or daffodil-themed items for the 3000 Daffodils Project.
- (4) Further notes that the aim of the project is to create 3,000 daffodils throughout August to sell as part of the fundraising activities – which is the same number of Tasmanians diagnosed with cancer each year – with all funds raised from the sale of craft items **to** stay in Tasmania to assist the Cancer Council Tasmania deliver services to people living with cancer.

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- (5) Recognises that cancer is the leading cause of death in Australia, with one in three Australians developing some form of the disease by the age of 85, and further recognises the devastating impact it has on Tasmanians, their families, friends, colleagues and the community.
- (6) Encourages all Tasmanians to show their support for the 2020 Daffodil Day Appeal by donating to life-saving cancer research that will help to improve earlier detection and diagnosis, which we know leads to better outcomes with treatment more successful. (27 August 2020)

339 Ms *White* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that 6 August 2020 was the 75th anniversary of the nuclear attack on Hiroshima.
- (2) Remembers the victims and survivors of Hiroshima, and of Nagasaki, bombed three days later.
- (3) Acknowledges the dedication and unceasing work of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, founded in Australia and awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2017, promoting adherence to and implementation of the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in one hundred countries around the world.
- (4) Calls on Members to honour the victims and survivors of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki by signing the 'Parliamentary Pledge for the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons', which is a commitment by parliamentarians around the world to work to promote the signature and ratification of the Treaty by their respective countries. (15 September 2020)

340 Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the coronavirus pandemic has inflicted anxiety, sorrow and mental ill-health across the Tasmanian community.
- (2) Acknowledges Tasmanians in the aged care system have been particularly affected by COVID-19 restrictions and more isolated than many others in the community.
- (3) Further recognises that communication channels are critical to older people in aged care facilities.
- (4) Understands while most patients in Tasmanian hospitals have a bedside phone, an estimated 40 per cent – approximately 2,000 Tasmanian aged care residents - do not have a phone in their room.
- (5) Further understands Advocacy Tasmania has written to Minister for Youth, Sport, Aged Care and Senior Australians, Senator the Hon. Richard Colbeck on behalf of more than 5,000 Tasmanians living in aged care asking for in-room phones which they claim are a "lifeline".
- (6) Agrees a critical part of tackling elder abuse is the ability to ask for assistance.
- (7) Calls on the Gutwein Government to work with Federal Minister Colbeck to ensure all Tasmanians in aged care had access to in-room phones. (15 September 2020)

341 Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that 15 September 2020 was the International Day for Democracy.
- (2) Agrees that key to democratic societies is freedom of speech and expression, a central part of which is a free press.
- (3) Understands that:—
 - (a) Australian writer, Yang Hengjun, was taken by Chinese authorities in January 2019, and is still in detention without charge;
 - (b) Cheng Lei, Australian anchor for China's government-run English news channel CGTN, was detained in Beijing, with the Australian Government notified of her detention on 14 August 2020 without charge; and
 - (c) The ABC's Bill Birtles and Tasmanian Mike Smith, from the Australian Financial Review, were forced to flee China on 8 September 2020 after a tense five-day diplomatic standoff.
- (4) Notes there are now no Australian journalists working for Australian media organisations in mainland China.
- (5) Further agrees with Federal Labor Leader, Hon. Anthony Albanese MP's comments on the ABC's Insiders program that the Chinese Communist Government was "quite clearly" intervening in Australia and "that requires a response by the Australian Government in the national interest".

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- (6) Encourages Tasmanian Labor Members to take heed of their Federal Party Leader's comments and to remember their solemn obligation to stand up for democracy and human rights. (15 September 2020)

342 Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes with disdain Tasmania has the weakest donation disclosure laws in the country and is the only State without a State-based legislative framework for donations.
- (2) Acknowledges the case was strongly made for electoral donations reform at the last State Election, when millions of dollars in donations went undisclosed.
- (3) Understand that lowering the threshold for political donations disclosure is critical to electoral reform.
- (4) Agrees that political donations must be disclosed in real time.
- (5) Recognises that to clean up democracy requires expenditure caps, bans on corporate donations and donations from foreign interests, and public funding for election campaigns as with every other Australian State, Territory and the Commonwealth.
- (6) Further notes, following wide public consultation, the Attorney-General, Hon. Elise Archer MP, received a report of the review of Tasmania's weak political donations framework in late 2019 and has not released it.
- (7) Calls on the Attorney-General to release the report publicly and prioritise electoral reforms ahead of the next State Election. (15 September 2020)

343 Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges conservation covenants established under the 'Nature Conservation Act 2002' make a critical contribution to protection of natural values, ecosystem services and biodiversity.
- (2) Notes there are 890 conservation covenants on private land, covering approximately 110,000 hectares.
- (3) Further notes with concern that, as a result of changes to the planning system, the Gutwein Government is seeking to have all covenants on private land zoned Rural use.
- (4) Further notes this zoning allows for resource extraction, including logging and mining.
- (5) Further notes the new Landscape Conservation zoning category prohibits resource extraction such as logging and mining.
- (6) Further notes the Department of State Growth is writing to Councils tasked with rezoning conservation covenants under the State Planning Provisions (SPP) urging rejection of Landscape Conservation zoning, on the basis it would have a, "sterilising effect on rural land ... and potential to limit future resource use and development."
- (7) Recognises each established conservation covenant was agreed between private landowners and the Crown, represented by the Minister for Environment and Parks, Hon. Roger Jaensch MP on the basis of protection in perpetuity.
- (8) Further notes there has been no engagement by the Environment Minister with covenant land holders in relation to this proposed weakening of protections, and agrees this is disrespectful at best.
- (9) Agrees the most appropriate zoning for all land under conservation covenant is Landscape Conservation.
- (10) Calls on the Minister for Planning, Hon. Roger Jaensch MP who is also the Minister for Environment and Parks, to issue a Planning Directive to ensure covenanted land is protected from resource extraction through Landscape Conservation zoning across all municipalities. (15 September 2020)

344 Ms *Haddad* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on 3 May 2018, then Premier, Will Hodgman, announced that the Government would conduct a review into Tasmania's Electoral Act.
- (2) Further notes that an interim report was released in December 2018 which led to the 'Electoral Amendment Bill 2019' implementing several administrative changes to the Act.
- (3) Further notes that the Government commissioned a second review and community consultation was held on the more substantive issues surrounding electoral donations laws.

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- (4) Understands the report from this consultation was received by Government in December 2019.
- (5) Calls on the Attorney-General to release this report by tabling it in Parliament. (15 September)

345 Mr *Street* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the COVID-19 pandemic emergency has had a significant effect on employment levels in Tasmania, but there is a cautious optimism in Tasmania right now and confidence is building.
- (2) Notes that increased confidence is seeing jobs growth return, evidenced by the recent positive Australian Bureau of Statistics' (ABS) labour force and payroll jobs data showing Tasmania had the highest monthly and fortnightly, respectively, employment growth in Australia.
- (3) Further notes that in Tasmania, home loan numbers are up, more houses are being built, and retail trade is back at record levels.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania entered the pandemic from a position of economic strength, with a strong budget and balance sheet, and that this is helping our recovery.
- (5) Further acknowledges that the positive jobs and economic data reported in recent weeks is good news for Tasmania as we cautiously step out of the COVID-19 pandemic emergency. (15 September 2020)

346 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that today is Battle of Britain Day, an annual day of remembrance for those who fought and died in the Battle of Britain, history's first entirely aerial campaign and a strategic turning point of the Second World War.
- (2) Notes that the Battle occurred over the United Kingdom between 10 July 1940 and 31 October 1940 between the air forces of Nazi Germany and the then British Empire and Commonwealth.
- (3) Further notes that Allied success in the Battle was pivotal in seeing the planned seaborne invasion of the United Kingdom by Hitler's Germany cancelled, allowing the British Isles to eventually become the springboard from which the invasion of occupied Europe was performed, leading to the liberation of millions under Nazi oppression.
- (4) Pays tribute to 'The Few', as Winston Churchill immortally named the fighter pilots fighting in the skies over Britain, for their service, courage and sacrifice, including more than thirty Australians, 14 of whom died in the Battle including Flight Lieutenant Stuart Walch, of Hobart, who attended the Hutchins School before joining the RAAF.
- (5) Acknowledges a memorial service commemorating the Battle held at St David's Cathedral on the weekend of 12-13 September 2020 and a wreath laying service at the Hobart Cenotaph with representatives from the Australian Defence Force, ex-service organisations and all levels of Government attending. (15 September 2020)

347 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that 3 September 2020 was Australian National Flag Day, the annual day specifically dedicated to celebrating our national flag.
- (2) Further notes that Australian National Flag Day was officially established in 1996 by the proclamation of the former Governor-General Sir William Deane, AC, KBE, QC and celebrates the first time the flag was flown on 3 September 1901 over the dome of the Exhibition Building in Melbourne when then Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Sir Edmund Barton GCMG, KC announced the winners of a competition to design a flag for Australia.
- (3) Acknowledges the Australian National Flag as Australia's foremost national symbol and a unifying and powerful expression of Australian identity.
- (4) Further notes that Australian National Flag Day provides all Australians with an opportunity to reflect with pride and gratitude upon the achievements and qualities of this great nation since Federation.
- (5) Further acknowledges the sterling work of the Australian National Flag Association in promoting and protecting our national symbol, whose work locally is led by Mr Reg Watson.

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- (6) Congratulates all individuals, community organisations, local authorities, businesses and schools across Tasmania that celebrated Australian National Flag Day by conducting flag-raising ceremonies and by flying or displaying the National Flag. (15 September 2020)

4 2019 Federal Election: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 22 May 2019 by Mr *Shelton*—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses.

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:—" and inserting instead:

- “(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised

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serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.

- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio.” (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party’s recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania’s Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

9 Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.
- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania’s businesses are now measured as the most confident in the nation, that Tasmania has the best business conditions in the nation and that Tasmanian small businesses are the powerhouse of our economy.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Shadow Treasurer, Hon. David O’Byrne MP’s public admission this week that, after five and a half years in Opposition, Labor still has no vision or plan.

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- (6) Endorses the Hodgman majority Liberal Government's plan to continue to grow the economy and help create jobs, by supporting Tasmanian businesses and unlocking investment opportunities in Tasmania. (Next Speaker: Ms *O'Byrne*)
