Notices of Motion

118 Ms Butler to move—That the House:—

- Notes that 14 20 October 2018 was Seniors Week.
- Further notes that the over-arching theme of 2018 was "food, glorious food" with (2) some 500 events around the State holding events with a food theme.
- (3) Recognises that Seniors Week showcases the amazing source of knowledge and expertise older Tasmanians provide to our communities.
- Understands that an estimated 10,000 people will attend events around the State this (4)
- Further notes that Seniors week is a celebration of older people in our community. (5) (17 October 2018)

119 Ms Standen to move—That the House:—

- Notes that 14 20 October 2018 was Anti-Poverty Week.
- Further notes poverty has many complex causes, which means there is no single, (2) quick, or easy solution and long-term change of the necessary scale requires more than just supporting people on the ground.
- (3) Further notes that 1 in 3 people in the world live in poverty, in Australia almost 2.2 million people -9% of the population live in poverty.
- (4) Acknowledges that in the last 2 decades 660 million people have risen out of poverty, with the collaborative work of many and political will, it is possible to achieve a world that is free of poverty.
- Calls on all Parties to promote awareness within the community of the effects of (5) poverty and 'Make Poverty History'. (17 October 2018)

120 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- Congratulates the Tasmanian Minerals and Energy Council (TMEC), for developing and staging the 'Tassies's Better with Balance Multi-Sport Event 2018', and for their leadership in promoting mental health and wellbeing in the sector.
- Notes that the multi-day endurance sports event ran from 8 14 October 2018 and (2) raised funds and awareness for Rural Alive and Well (RAW) Tasmania's mental health and wellbeing outreach programs.
- Further congratulates the eight Tasmanians Matt Wilson, Michael Phillips, Kym (3) Child, Steve Phillips, Greg Pilkington, Adrian Beard, Marty Viney and Kent Wyllie who competed in three components, (cycling, kayaking and trail running) over a distance of 1,200 kilometres.
- Further notes:-(4)
 - the launch in March 2017 of the TMEC Blueprint of Mental Health and Wellbeing; and

- (b) the Hodgman Liberal Government's \$95 million, six year plan to deliver a range of improvements to build a better mental health system, ensuring Tasmanians get the right support.
- (5) Commends RAW for its tremendous work in supporting individuals, families and the community through mental health issues, especially in our rural and regional areas.
- (6) Further congratulates all event sponsors and supporters including Bluestone Mines Tasmania Joint Venture, Irrigation Tas, Recycal Pty Ltd, Alpha Electrics, Zezt Pty Ltd, Bell Bay Aluminium, Caltas Pty Ltd, Elphinstone Pty Ltd and Jemrok Pty Ltd, and others for what was a tremendously successful event. 121 The Minister for Building and Construction to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Battery of the Nation with further interconnection will guarantee Tasmania's own energy requirements, whilst offering surplus energy for interstate consumers, which is low cost, reliable and clean.
- (2) Acknowledges that Battery of the Nation with increased interconnection is regarded as nation building and nation leading infrastructure that leverages our natural advantages.
- (3) Recognises that the Battery of the Nation hydro and wind developments, with further interconnection, will bring an economic transformation investment of billions of dollars, creation of thousands of jobs, and doubling of Tasmania's energy capacity.
- (4) Commends our Prime Minister, Hon. Scott Morrison MP and former Prime Minister, Malcolm Turnbull for their support to progress these projects.
- (5) Congratulates Hydro Tasmania, TasNetworks and the Hodgman Liberal Government for their commitment and carriage of these important projects, working in partnership with the Australian Government through the Australian Renewable Energy Agency.
- (6) Emphasises the importance of these projects in contributing to firstly the Hodgman Liberal Government's Tasmania-First energy policy to deliver a target of the lowest regulated electricity prices in the nation, and 100% self-sufficiency in renewable energy by 2022 and secondly delivering low cost, reliable and clean energy.
- (7) Proclaims its support and commitment to the Battery of the Nation projects. (18 October 2018)

- (3) Further notes that the theme for 2018 WorkSafe Month is 'future work, future challenges', which focuses on the impact emerging technologies and platforms will have on work health and safety and workers' compensation over the next 20 years.
- (4) Further notes that activities held over WorkSafe Month 2018 include:—
 - (a) the Walk for Wellbeing along the Montrose Foreshore;
 - (b) the biennial WorkSafe Conference on 22 and 23 October 2018 at the Hotel Grand Chancellor in Hobart, and will include a celebratory function on Monday 22 October to recognise the 2018 WorkSafe Awards recipients;
 - (c) free state-wide regional activities, including a forum with Beyondblue at Flinders Island, and the Strahan 'Beach to Bay' Fun Run;
 - (d) Effective Risk Management Workshops held in a number of locations across the State; and
 - (e) Safe Work Australia free online seminars, showcasing the latest thinking, research, developments and best practice in workplace health and safety.
- (5) Thanks the staff of WorkSafe Tasmania, Tasmanian employers and employees, for their often unsung work in promoting workplace health and safety.
- (6) Acknowledges that work health and safety should be an important part of every workplace's culture, no matter how big or small, as it is everyone's responsibility to stay safe at work. (18 October 2018)

- **8** Tasmanian Export Growth: Adjourned debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 26 September 2018 by Mr *Hidding*, as amended—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that the most recent export figures released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) show Tasmania exported a near-record \$3.7 billion of goods in the year to July 2018.
 - (2) Further notes that Tasmania leads the nation with 29.2 per cent growth in exports over 2017, which is nearly four times higher than the national rate of growth.
 - (3) Further notes that over 80 per cent of Tasmanian goods exports were into Asian markets, with top export sectors being mining and mineral products, as well as agriculture and seafood.
 - (4) Further notes that Tasmania's top five export destinations were China, Malaysia, Japan, Taiwan and Thailand representing \$2.25 billion worth of our total exports.
 - (5) Further notes that this continued strong growth in exports demonstrates the success of the Government's plan to open up new opportunities for Tasmanian products, underpinned by Trade Missions with the business sector to important export markets.
 - (6) Further notes that the Government's strong focus on trade is leading to new investment and job creating opportunities in Tasmania. (Next Speaker: Ms O'Connor)
