Notices of Motion

310 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on 19 June 2020, Tasmanian Cyclist Amy Cure announced her retirement from international cycling.
- (2) Recognises that this young Tasmanian woman is one of the masters of the track on the international stage. Amy is a three-time world champion and the only track cyclist in history to win a medal in six different world championship events.
- (3) Further recognises that Amy has represented our country on two occasions at the Commonwealth Games, with two gold medals in 2018. Amy is also a three-time Olympian, having been selected for Tokyo 2020.
- (4) Joins with me to congratulate Amy on not only being a wonderful role model in the sporting community, but for also being an inspirational Tasmanian woman. (25 June 2020)

311 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the need to appropriately use Launceston Remand Centre and for northern prisoners to be less isolated from friends and family.
- (2) Understands the Government's plan to build a northern prison will not improve the safety of communities in the north, nor help rehabilitate inmates, and would cost the State a fortune.
- (3) Realises the far preferable alternative is to repurpose the existing Ashley Youth Detention Centre for adult inmates, and build two fit-for-purpose restorative justice centres for youth detainees.
- (4) Further understands the Government's obsession with building a new prison at Westbury is damaging, and its approach to selecting the site has put significant strain on the Westbury community.
- (5) Notes the Westbury community's backlash forced the Government to reconsider its first preferred site, and no consultation was undertaken about the selection of a new location.
- (6) Acknowledges the 70 hectares of forest at Westbury Reserve, now designated as the prison site, is part of the Tasmanian Reserve Estate, set aside under the Regional Forest Agreement.
- (7) Further acknowledges Westbury Reserve is a haven for threatened species of flora and fauna, including Tasmanian devils, grey goshawks, masked owls, wedge-tailed eagles.
- (8) Calls on the Government to abandon its plan to put a prison on the Westbury Reserve, and look instead to repurposing Ashley Youth Detention Centre. (25 June 2020)

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- 312** Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House censures the Minister for Resources, Hon. Guy Barnett MP on the grounds that he has treated Parliament with contempt by refusing to answer questions in the public interest on forests.
- 313** The Attorney-General to move—That the House pursuant to Section 37 of the Australian Consumer Law (Tasmania) Act 2010, the House of Assembly endorse the draft code of practice prepared in accordance with Section 37(3) of the Australian Consumer Law (Tasmania) Act 2010.
- 314** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises that 18 August 2020, is Vietnam Veterans Day, an annual day of remembrance for those who served during the Vietnam War.
 - (2) Notes that this day, originally known as Long Tan Day, commemorates the day in 1966 when the battle of Long Tan was fought by the men of D Company, 6th Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment (6RAR).
 - (3) Further notes that this day, first commemorated in 1969 with the raising of a cross at the battlefield by the men of 6RAR, has since been adopted to cover all veterans who served in the Vietnam War—the longest conflict in Australia’s history.
 - (4) Pays tribute to the almost 60,000 Australians who served in Vietnam between May 1962 and April 1975, including 521 who paid the ultimate price and more than 3,000 who were wounded.
 - (5) Acknowledges the service of the approximately 1,800 Tasmanians who served in Vietnam, including 17 who died in their country’s service.
 - (6) Further notes commemorative service and wreath-laying ceremonies being held in Tasmania to mark the event, and thanks all the members of the VVAA Tasmania, including State President Terry Roe, for their efforts in supporting Vietnam veterans across the State over the years.
 - (7) Honours the service and sacrifice of all those who fought for freedom in this conflict and remembers the motto of the VVAA: “Honour the Dead but Fight like Hell for the Living.” (18 August 2020)
- 315** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises the Hydro Tasmania COVID-19 Community Grant Program that was initiated to target the ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the Tasmanian way of life.
 - (2) Notes the Program was opened for applications at the end of May 2020, providing grants of up to \$10,000 to help rebuild communities’.
 - (3) Further notes that 29 successful applicants have now received a total of \$139,991 with recipients including local sport clubs and mental health programs and support provided including bathroom renovations, a cake stall and a ride-on lawnmower.
 - (4) Acknowledges the 2020 round of Hydro Tasmania’s annual Community Grant Program, which made grants of up to \$5,000 available to 11 recipients.
 - (5) All these recipients were highly worthy, including:—
 - (a) the Derwent Valley SES (State Emergency Service) where the community grant will help update equipment and facilities;
 - (b) the Sheffield School Association who will establish a working garden for Prep – Year 6 classes at the Sheffield School; and
 - (c) the King Island District High School who are building new dining courtyard to be used by students, staff and the wider community.
 - (6) Further acknowledges that in total, between March and July 2020, Hydro Tasmania has provided \$238,000 for not-for-profit organisations, which includes staff donations and expansions of sponsorships with its existing community partners.
 - (7) Congratulates the Government owned energy businesses for their support of the Tasmanian community during these times. (18 August 2020)
- 316** Mr *Tucker* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Acknowledges that, while the COVID-19 pandemic emergency has presented a global health crisis, it has also delivered significant economic and social challenges here in Tasmania.

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- (2) Notes the recent positive Australian Bureau of Statistics' (ABS) labour force data which showed Tasmania had the highest employment growth in Australia, and the lowest unemployment rate of all the states for the recent reporting period.
- (3) Further notes that the ABS data also showed 7,000 more Tasmanians back in work in July 2020, and that 13,400 Tasmanians are now back in work in seasonally adjusted terms since May 2020, the height of the pandemic.
- (4) Supports job-creating infrastructure projects like the Government's Northern Regional Prison project at Brushy Rivulet, which will underpin more than 1000 jobs and deliver an economic boost of \$500 million to Northern Tasmania at a time when they need it most.
- (5) Further acknowledges the most recent 'CommSec 'State of the States' analysis reporting Tasmania with the strongest economy in the country, and this week's latest 'Sensis Business Index' report for August 2020 which shows Tasmanian businesses are the most confident about our economy in the country.
- (6) Recognises that, as public leaders, we have a responsibility to do everything we can to help improve confidence levels in the market, and in our community, to support job creation and job security and to help Tasmania rebuild and recover from the pandemic emergency. (18 August 2020)

317 Mr *O'Bryne* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Tasmanian families are crying out for support to relieve the financial stress caused by increased household power bills this winter.
- (2) Understands that tens of thousands of Tasmanians have spent more time at home, for home schooling, working from home or simply heeding the call to only go out when necessary as a part of Government announced restrictions as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- (3) Acknowledges that this will be reflected in Tasmanian's power bills through increased power usage in what has been a particularly cold winter.
- (4) Further understands thousands of households are already suffering from bill shock at a time when they can least afford it.
- (5) Further notes that the Liberal Government provided a winter energy supplement to Tasmanian households in a 2018 election-eve provision of a \$10 million special energy bonus in the middle of summer.
- (6) Further acknowledges that Tasmanians should not be financially punished for doing the right thing.
- (7) Further notes the Premier's own Economic and Social Recovery Council has flagged concerns about the capacity of vulnerable Tasmanians to pay for heating during the cold winter months.
- (8) Calls on the Government to back the Labor policy of providing a winter energy supplement to Tasmanian households in financial stress. (18 August 2020)

318 Mr *White* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that not all 'essential workers' exempt from quarantine are required to have a Covid-19 test on arrival in Tasmania.
- (2) Understands that 'essential workers' who are required to have a test do not have to quarantine until they get a result which means they are allowed on the worksite when they could be Covid-19 positive.
- (3) Agrees that a thorough assessment of the local labour market needs to be undertaken before any interstate workers are given permission to come to Tasmania to ensure that Tasmanians are given the first chance to pick up work in our State.
- (4) Acknowledges the sacrifices made by the Tasmanian community throughout the Covid-19 crisis and the importance of making sure we continue to look after the health of our community and our economy.
- (5) Recognises the significant consequences the Tasmanian community would experience if there was another Covid-19 outbreak in our State.
- (6) Calls on the Government to immediately introduce mandatory testing for all 'essential workers' coming to the State who are exempt from quarantine and require all 'essential workers' to quarantine until a test result is known. (18 August 2020)

319 Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the planet is experiencing a human-induced climate and biodiversity crisis and agrees there is no justification for native forest logging.
- (2) Notes that 'Sustainable' Timber Tasmania (STT) continues to clearfell and burn old forests that are critical habitat for rare, threatened and endangered species.
- (3) Recognises STT's second and most recent failure to obtain Forest Stewardship Certification is a damning indictment on logging practices under the Liberal Government.
- (4) Notes SGS Global's audit has shown how far from meeting the Forrester Stewardship Council (FSC) standards STT are, with ten major non-conformities identified.
- (5) Recognises ethical global markets and consumers do not want wood products sourced from old growth forests, nor do most Tasmanians.
- (6) Acknowledges the audit called for all old growth forests to be protected from logging.
- (7) Recognises the audit was scathing of the Government logging in swift parrot habitat, finding:—
 - (a) STT logged swift parrot habitat despite expert advice warning against it;
 - (b) even with STT's set aside area of less than 10,000 ha, swift parrot habitat would still be logged within areas subject to the Government's unreleased Public Authority Management Agreement (PAMA);
 - (c) the proposed PAMA does not apply to significant critical swift parrot habitat along the East Coast, South East and in the North West.
- (8) Agrees the Minister for Resources, Hon. Guy Barnett MP's claims that STT logging practices are 'world class' is fraudulent.
- (9) Calls on the Government to end native forest logging in Tasmania to protect critical habitat and forest carbon stores. (18 August 2020)

320 Ms *Standen* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes with deep concern recent reports in 'The Examiner' about long-standing workplace culture and technical issues at Heritage Tasmania that have existed since 2014.
- (2) Recognises that in 2014 when the Liberal Government came to power, staffing numbers were slashed at Heritage Tasmania, and those that remained were expected to cut the Heritage Register by a third.
- (3) Acknowledges that Heritage staff were under enormous pressure, and with reduced resources, mistakes were made.
- (4) Further recognises that as a result the integrity of the Heritage Register is compromised and a cloud of legal uncertainty hangs over property owners and potentially the Crown.
- (5) Further notes that in a leaked staff satisfaction survey, Heritage staff state they are stressed and anxious, alleging ongoing harassment, bullying, extensive workloads, and a lack of direction from management.
- (6) Further notes with concern that a cultural change plan that has been running since May 2019 appears to have no end date.
- (7) Further recognises that in this term of government, instability in ministerial portfolios has contributed to longstanding issues continually being ignored.
- (8) Calls on the Hon. Elise Archer MP, Minister for Heritage, to take urgent action to intervene to fix these problems and restore damage to morale, reputation and relationships between Heritage Tasmania and other Agencies. (18 August 2020)

321 Ms *Standen* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the theme of National Homelessness Week (2-8 August 2020) in Tasmania was "Housing Ends Homelessness".
- (2) Recognises there is a current estimated shortfall in social and affordable housing of 11,400 homes across Tasmania.
- (3) Further notes that the Liberal Government's May Economic and Fiscal Update (14 August 2020) reports a \$23M underspend on affordable housing; and that there was a \$16M underspend in the Treasurer's Annual Financial Report 2018-19.
- (4) Acknowledges that the Premier's Economic and Social Recovery Advisory Council's interim report focus on affordable housing construction.

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- (5) Further notes that the House of Assembly's Select Committee on Housing Affordability report (Feb 2020) provided a comprehensive blueprint on tackling the housing and homelessness crisis.
- (6) Calls on the Government to respond to the 61 recommendations in the Select Committee report including to act without delay to develop an evidence based 25-year plan to 2050 governing how to address housing affordability and availability in Tasmania. (18 August 2020)

4 2019 Federal Election: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 22 May 2019 by Mr *Shelton*—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses.

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.

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- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio.” (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party’s recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania’s Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

9 Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.
- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania’s businesses are now measured as the most confident in the nation, that Tasmania has the best business conditions in the nation and that Tasmanian small businesses are the powerhouse of our economy.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Shadow Treasurer, Hon. David O’Byrne MP’s public admission this week that, after five and a half years in Opposition, Labor still has no vision or plan.
