A Motion was made (Mrs *Hiscutt*) and the Question was proposed, That so much of Standing Order no. 284 be suspended in respect of this Bill so as to allow the amended clause reference only to be called without a need for the amendments to be read again in full.

The Motion was, by leave, withdrawn. (Mrs Hiscutt)

The Amendments were read the First time.

A Motion was made (Mrs *Hiscutt*) and the Question was proposed, That the Amendments be read the Second time.

A Debate arose thereupon.

And the Question being put, It was resolved in the Affirmative

The said Amendments, being read the Second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That the Bill as amended in the Committee, be now read the Third time. (Mrs Hiscutt)

The Bill was read the Third time and passed.

6 BILL NO. 32.— The Order of the Day was read for the Second reading of the Residential Tenancy Amendment Bill 2018 (No. 32).

A Motion was made (Mrs *Hiscutt*), and the Question was proposed, That the Bill be now read the Second time.

A Debate arose thereupon.

And the Question being put,

It was resolved in the Affirmative.

And the Bill was, accordingly, read the Second time and committed to a Committee of the Whole Council.

And the President having left the Chair, the Council resolved itself into the said Committee.

Clauses 1 to 10 agreed to.

Clause 11 disagreed to.

Clause 12 agreed to.

New Clause A [Section 17 amended Issue of replacement residential tenancy agreement] brought up (Mr *Gaffney*) and read the First time as follows:—

Section 17 of the Principal Act is amendment as follows:

(a)by omitting subsection (1) and substituting the following subsections:

- (1) In this section
 - "original agreement" means a residential tenancy agreement in relation to residential premises referred to in subsection (2);
 - "replacement agreement" means a residential tenancy agreement established under subsection (1A)(b) or (c).
- (1A) If the person against whom an FVO is to be made is a tenant of residential premises occupied by an affected person, a court may make an order under section 16 to -
 - (a) terminate the original agreement; or
 - (b) terminate the original agreement and establish a new residential tenancy agreement for the benefit of the affected person and any other party who was a party to the terminated agreement, other than the person against whom the FVO is to be made; or
 - (c) terminate the original agreement and establish a new residential tenancy agreement for the benefit of the person against whom the FVO is to be made and any other party who was a party to the terminated agreement, other than the affected person.

Read the Second time and made part of the Bill (to follow Clause 10 in Part 3).

Title agreed to.

Bill to be reported with Amendments.

The Council being resumed, Ms *Forrest* reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and directed her to report the same to the Council with Amendments.

Ordered, That the consideration of the Bill as amended in Committee be made an Order of the Day for Tuesday next. (Mrs *Hiscutt*)

A Debate arose thereupon.

And Mr Dean having presented the said Bill, the same was read the First time, and ordered to be printed.

Ordered, That the Second reading of the Bill be made an Order of the Day for Tuesday next. (Mr Dean)

13 LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL SELECT COMMITTEE REPORT ON FIREARM LAW REFORMS.— The Order of the Day was read for resuming the Debate on the Question, That the Report of the Legislative Council Select Committee on Firearm Law Reforms be considered and noted.

The Ouestion was again proposed and the Council resumed the Debate.

Ordered, That Mr Dean have leave to resume his reply to the Debate at the next Sitting.
