1.1 Overview and Strategy

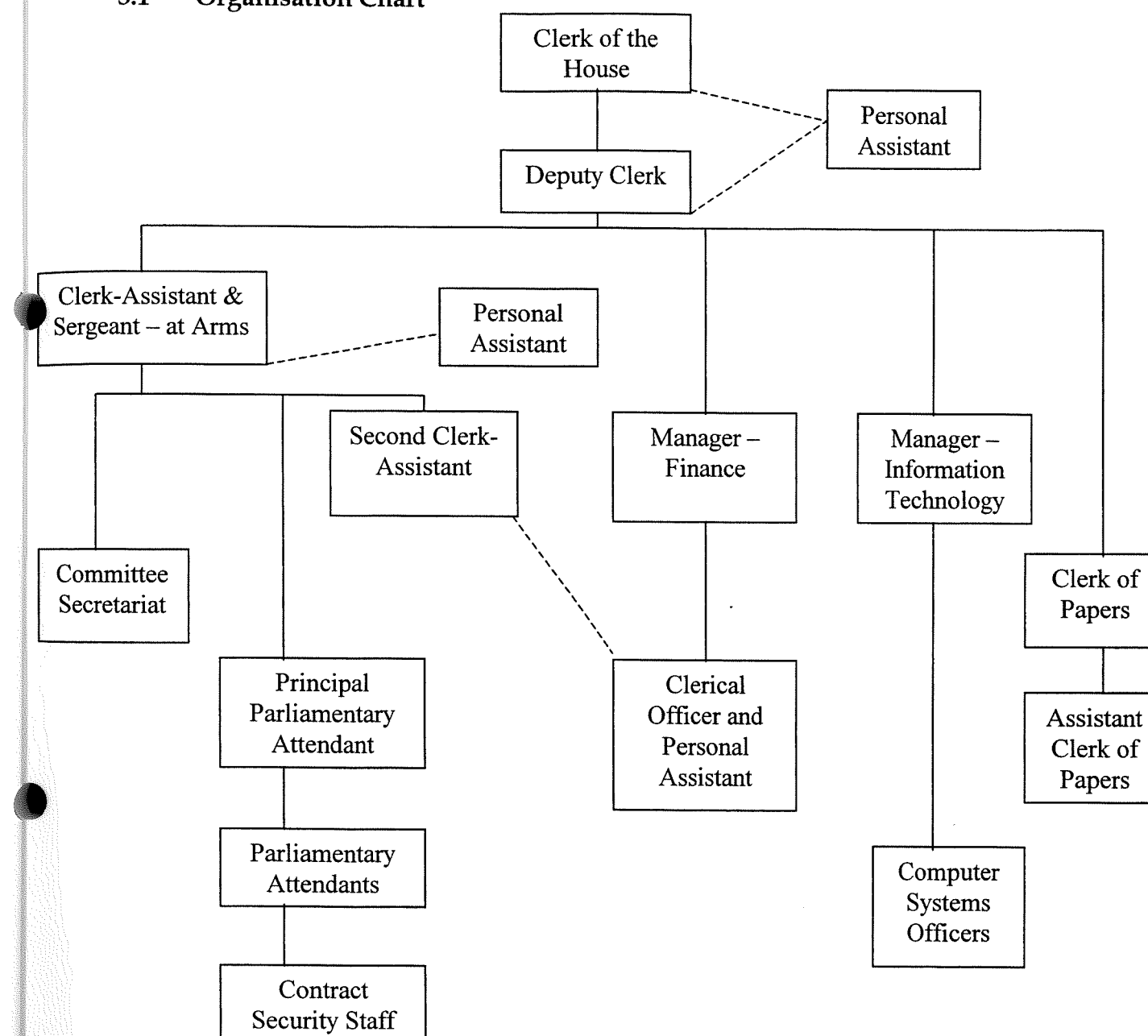

4.4 Work of committees

A summary of the Committee work supported by the Secretariat is set out below.

Parliamentary Standing Committee on Community Development

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Community Development, was established by order of both Houses on 6 December 2000 following a recommendation of the Select Committee on the Working Arrangements of Parliamentary.

The Committee was established on a trial basis for two years as part of the review of Parliamentary functions in light of the reduced numbers of members in both Houses.

The membership of the Committee at 30 June 2002 was Ms Lin Thorp MLC (Chair), Mr Kerry Finch MLC (Deputy Chair), Ms Alison Ritchie MLC, Mr David Fry MHA, Mr Ken Bacon MHA and Mrs G James MHA.

In the financial year 2001 - 2002 the Committee met on 15 occasions, including public hearings at which a total of 20 witnesses were examined.

References before the Committee during this period included, the inquiry into the Legal Recognition of Significant Relationships, an inquiry into Ambulance Services in Tasmania and the Custodial Grandparents inquiry.

On 19 December 2001 the Committee brought up a report on the Legal Recognition of Significant Personal Relationships, which was tabled in both Houses.

The prorogation of Parliament on 1 February 2001 curtailed the work the Committee until its reappointment on 12 March 2002.

The resignation of two Committee members and delays in replacements being appointed due to the Legislative Council elections meant that the Committee was unable to sit prior to 28 May 2002. Shortly thereafter Parliament was dissolved for House of Assembly elections.

At 30 June 2002 the inquiries into Tasmanian Ambulance Services and Custodial Grandparents were yet to be completed.

Joint Select Committee on Gene Technology

On 6 September 2000 by order of the House of Assembly and the Legislative Council a Joint Select Committee was appointed to inquire and report upon issues relating to the use of Gene Technology.

The membership of the Committee was Mr David Llewellyn MHA (Chair), Mr Bill Bonde MHA, Ms Peg Putt MHA, Mrs Cathy Edwards MLC (6 Sept. 2000 - 4 May 2001), Ms Lin Thorp MLC, Mr Colin Rattray MLC and Mr Geoff Squibb MLC (appointed 31 May 2001)

In the financial year 2001 - 2002 the Gene Technology Committee met on one occasion in order to formally approve the final report of the Chair and to arrange for its tabling.

As Parliament was not sitting at the time prior arrangements had been made for the presentation of the report to the Speaker of the House of Assembly, who formally accepted the report on Wednesday 11, July 2002.

Joint Select Committee on the Working Arrangements of the Parliament

The Committee was established by order of the House of Assembly and the Legislative Council on 7 October 1998.

The membership of the Committee as at 30th June 2002 was Mr Michael Aird MLC (Chair), Mr Don Wing MLC, Mrs Sue Smith MLC, Mr Paul Lennon MHA, Dr Peter Patmore MHA and Mr Michael Hodgman QC MHA.

Occupational health and safety matters have and will continue to be considered in some detail within this plan.

9.2 EDUCATION AND AWARENESS OF SERVICES

Youth Parliament

The YMCA Tasmanian Youth Parliament was conducted from Tuesday 11 September to Friday 14 September 2001. The Minister for Education representing the Premier opened the session and remained to participate in the role of Speaker for the first Bill. During the session a number of Members from the House of Assembly and the Legislative Council assisted by acting in the role of Speaker, a gesture greatly appreciated by the students involved.

Teams of three and four students from fourteen schools and colleges participated in debating Bills on a range of subjects. Some of the titles were Smoking in Pubs, Forestry, Compulsory Physical Education and Pokies in Pubs. All teams took on the sponsoring role (Government) and a rebuttal role (Opposition).

The Youth Motion and Adjournment concluded the proceedings and the week finished with a reception where the Resolutions passed by the Youth Parliament were presented to representative of the Government.

United Nations Youth Assembly

The United Nations Youth Association, a national organisation involved in educating young people about the United Nations and international affairs, conducted its annual Assembly on 19 May 2002. Approximately sixty college students participated in the weekend activities.

Visitors

When either House of Parliament is in session visitors may, of course, attend at any time.

Tours of the Parliament are available to casual visitors, community groups and school parties on non-sitting days of the Parliament and there are over 20,000 visitors each year.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

To the Clerk of the House

Scope

I have audited the financial report of the House of Assembly for the year ended 30 June 2002 comprising Statements of Financial Performance, Financial Position, Cash Flows, Compliance with Consolidated Fund Appropriations, and notes thereto. The Clerk of the House, as Head of Agency, is responsible under section 27(1) of the *Financial Management and Audit Act 1990* for the preparation of the financial report in accordance with the reporting framework prescribed in the Treasurer's Instructions issued under the Act. I have conducted an independent audit of the financial report in order to express an opinion on it to the Clerk.

The audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free of material misstatement. Notes to and forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2002

1. Objectives and funding

The House of Assembly (The House), together with the Legislative Council and His Excellency the Governor, constitute the Parliament of Tasmania, which has the responsibility to consider legislation and to authorise the expenditure of State monies.

The office of The Clerk of the House of Assembly provides the House, its Committees, the Speaker of the House and Members with advisory, procedural, research and administrative support services to assist them to effectively undertake their constitutional and Parliamentary duties.

The objectives of the office of the Clerk of the House are:-

- to support the House in its constitutional role
- to provide the highest levels of advice and procedural research and administrative services necessary for the effective functioning of the House, its committees and Members
- to promote public awareness of the purpose, functions and work of the House and encourage and facilitate visitation by the widest possible range of citizens
- to perform all of its functions at the highest attainable levels of professional competence and efficiency
- to be a fair and responsive employer, maximising the potential of all its staff through effective human resource practices

The House is predominantly funded by Parliamentary appropriations and reserved by law appropriations for the above services and for the administration of the payment of salaries and allowances as prescribed by the *Parliamentary Salaries, Superannuation and Allowances Act 1973*.

The financial report encompasses all Funds through which the House controls resources to carry on its functions.

In the process of preparing accrual based reports for the House as a single entity, all intra-entity transactions and balances have been eliminated.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are a general purpose financial report and have been prepared in accordance with:

- the Treasurer's Instructions issued under the provisions of the *Financial Management and Audit Act 1990*; and
- Australian Accounting Standards in particular AAS 29 'Financial reporting by Government Departments' and Urgent Issues Group Abstracts.

Except where stated, the financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are in accordance with historical cost convention. The accounting policies are generally consistent with the previous year.

Assets and liabilities are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow and the amounts of the assets or liabilities can be reliably measured.

Revenues and expenses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance when the flow or consumption or loss of economic benefits has occurred and can be reliably measured. Control arises in the period of appropriation.

Transactions and Balances Administered on a Whole of Government Basis

The House administers, but does not control, certain resources. It is accountable for the transactions involving such

administered resources, but does not have the discretion to deploy those resources for the achievement of the House's objectives.

Administered assets, liabilities, expenses and revenues are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements, forming a part of the general purpose report for the House. The administered items are disclosed on the same basis as is described for the financial statements of the House.

The schedules of administered revenues and expenses, assets and liabilities, and cash flows are prepared on the same basis, and using the same policies as for Departmental items, except where otherwise stated.

2.1 Revenue

The revenues described in this Note are revenues relating to the ordinary activities of the House.

Revenues are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance when it is probable that the inflow or other enhancement or saving in outflows of future economic benefits has occurred and can be measured reliably.

a) Revenues from Government - Appropriations

Appropriations, whether recurrent or capital are recognised as revenues in the period in which the House gains control of the appropriated funds.

b) Other Revenue

Revenues from commission on payroll deductions and from computer network support services are recognised when they are controlled by the House.

2.2 Expenses

The expenses described in this note are expenses arising from the ordinary activities of the House.

Expenses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance when it is probable that the consumption or loss of future economic benefits resulting in a reduction in assets and/or an increase in liabilities has occurred and the consumption or loss of future economic benefits can be measured reliably.

a) Employee Entitlements

Employee entitlements include entitlements to wages and salaries, annual leave, sick leave, long service leave, superannuation and other post-employment benefits.

b) Depreciation and Amortisation

All non-current assets having a limited useful life are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner which reflects the consumption of their service potential.

Depreciation is provided for on a straight line basis, using rates which are reviewed annually. Major depreciation periods are:

Computer Equipment	3 years
Furniture and Fittings	10 years

2.3 Assets

Assets are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position when it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied in the asset will eventuate and the asset possesses a cost or other value that can be measured reliably.

a) Cash on Hand and Deposit Accounts

Cash means notes, coins any deposits held at call with a bank or financial institution, as well as funds held in the Special Deposits and Trust Fund.

b) Receivables

Receivables are recognised at the amounts receivable as they are due for settlement. Collectability of receivables is

reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectible, are written off. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where some doubts exist as to collection.

c) Non-current assets

(i) Valuation basis

Non-current physical assets have been valued in accordance with AASB 1041 Revaluation of Non-Current Assets and Treasury Guidelines for the introduction of AASB 1041. Heritage assets are valued on the fair value basis. Equipment and other non-current assets are valued at cost. Fair Value is 'the amount for which an asset could be exchanged, or a liability settled between knowledgeable willing parties in an arms length transaction'.

(ii) Asset recognition threshold

With the exception of antique furniture and artworks and artefacts the asset capitalisation threshold adopted by the House is \$5,000. Assets valued at less than \$5,000 are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the year of purchase (other than where they form part of a group of similar items which are significant in total). Antique furniture and artworks and artefacts are treated as discrete groups of assets and all items in these groups are recorded as non current assets.

(iii) Revaluations

The House has adopted a revaluation threshold of \$5,000 above which assets are revalued on a 5 yearly basis.

Assets are grouped on the basis of having a similar nature or function in the operations of the House.

2.4 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position when it is probable that the future sacrifice of economic benefits will be required and the amount of the liability can be measured reliably.

a) Payables

Payables, including accruals not yet billed, are recognised when the House becomes obliged to make future payments as a result of a purchase of assets or services.

b) Provisions for Employee Entitlements

Liabilities for wages and salaries and annual leave are recognised, and are measured as the amount unpaid at the reporting date at current pay rates in respect of employees' services up to that date.

A liability for long service leave is recognised, and is measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date.

c) Superannuation

No superannuation liability is recognised for the accruing superannuation benefits of Departmental employees. This liability is held centrally and recognised within the Finance-General Division of the Department of Treasury and Finance.

During the reporting period, the House paid 11% of salary in respect of contributory members of the Retirement Benefits Fund into the Superannuation Provision Account within the Special Deposits and Trust Fund. The House paid the appropriate Superannuation Guarantee Charge into the nominated superannuation fund in respect of non-contributors.

2.5 Comparative Figures

Comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation in these financial statements where required

2.6 Rounding

All amounts in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars unless otherwise stated.

2.7 Departmental Taxation

The House is exempt from all forms of taxation except fringe benefits tax, payroll tax and the goods and services tax.

In the Statement of Cash Flows the GST component of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Australian Taxation Office is, in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, classified as operating cash flows.
