Notices of Motion

- 399** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the second round of Aurora Energy Community Grants Program 2020 which provides grants of up to \$10,000 for projects or programs that help disadvantaged Tasmanians.
 - (2) Further notes Aurora's Community Grants are focused on supporting disadvantaged Tasmanians through helping not for profit and community organisations to stay connected with their communities during COVID.
 - (3) Commends the five projects that have been awarded an Aurora Energy Community Grant in the second round for 2020:—
 - (a) 'Missing School' helping kids who miss school due to serious illness and injury to reconnect with their classmates through a telepresence robot service;
 - (b) 'Cancer Patients Foundation - Look Good Feel Better' in assisting cancer patients in managing appearance-related side-effects caused by cancer treatment;
 - (c) 'Launceston City Mission' in supporting some of Northern Tasmania's most vulnerable through the delivery of a wide range of community service programs;
 - (d) 'The Karadi Aboriginal Corporation' in providing integrated health and family services to the Aboriginal community of southern Tasmania and its Blossoms Project;
 - (e) 'The KIDS Foundation' in helping children and young adults recover from severe burns, life-changing injury, and trauma through its Camp TANGO (Together Achieving New Goals and Opportunities).
 - (4) Acknowledges at a time when many community groups and organisations are struggling with the demands and strains created by COVID-19, this fantastic community program continues to support them. (2 December 2020)
- 400** The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Australian Institute of Project Management has announced the winners of the 2020 Project Management Achievement Awards (PMAA). In its 20th year, the PMAAs exist to recognise, honour and promote outstanding achievement in program and project delivery.
 - (2) Acknowledges that TasNetworks Operating Model Improvement Program is a national winner in 2020 Project Management Awards.
 - (3) Further notes that TasNetworks was named as a winner in the following categories:—
 - (a) Tasmania Transformation Project of the Year 2020;
 - (b) Tasmania Overall Project of the Year 2020; and
 - (c) National Transformation Project of the Year 2020.
 - (4) Further notes that TasNetworks' Operating Model Improvement Program is focussed on working smarter and more efficiently for Tasmanian electricity customers. This

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includes actions like fixing power outages more quickly and improving customer service.

- (5) Further acknowledges that TasNetworks is striving to constantly improve and deliver higher standards for Tasmanians to ensure they have the best service possible. (3 December 2020)

401 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes industry advice that a national Safety, Health and Wellbeing survey found fishers are almost twice as likely as other Australians to experience ‘high’ or ‘very high’ levels of psychological distress.
- (2) Recognises the value of the Stay Afloat mental health support program.
- (3) Further notes that the Stay Afloat program is a partnership between Rural Alive and Well and the Tasmanian Seafood Industry Council.
- (4) Further notes State Government provided \$120,000 to support Stay Afloat in 2020 in response to Covid-19.
- (5) Further recognises the work of the Tasmanian Seafood Industry Council in raising funds to support this important program.
- (6) Further notes that as part of this fundraising activity, an online fundraising auction is being conducted, closing 2pm Wednesday 16th December 2020.
- (7) Further notes the importance of supporting our local fishers by eating more local seafood. (3 December 2020)

402 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the Junction Arts Festival on the launch of their special edition of the annual festival - Junction Hometown 2020.
- (2) Notes that the Tasmanian Government recognises the contribution Junction Arts makes to the cultural, social and economic wealth of the Northern Tasmanian community, which is why we are pleased to support this much-loved event.
- (3) Further notes that the 2020 event is extra special, marking a decade since Junction first began delivering ‘extraordinary experiences in unusual places’ for Tasmanians.
- (4) Recognises the COVID-19 pandemic has been an incredibly challenging time for many event organisers, who have had to postpone, cancel or pivot their traditional models.
- (5) Further congratulates the Junction Hometown 2020 organisers on the incredible work they have undertaken to deliver a COVID-safe event.
- (6) Encourages all Tasmanians to show their support, be responsible, and follow COVID safe behaviours so that we can keep doing the things we love. (3 December 2020)

403 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the annual Tamar Valley Cycle Challenge, incorporating Sally’s Ride, took place on 29 November 2020 in Launceston.
- (2) Notes that Sally’s Ride started in 2002 when Nurse Sally Fletcher was inspired by her work with young people to raise funds to support youth mental health in Tasmania.
- (3) Further notes that in 2009 Sally’s Ride was expanded, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Central Launceston, to create a community bike ride through the Tamar Valley which now consists of five cycle challenges ranging from the ten kilometre family ride to the 100 kilometre challenge for experienced riders.
- (4) Commends Sally’s Ride for the expansion of the race program, which has helped to raise awareness of the mental health challenges of young Tasmanians and provides an opportunity for people of all ages to participate and enjoy a healthy activity.
- (5) Further notes that e-bike riders were allowed for the first time, enabling even more Tasmanians to participate, including those with health issues who may otherwise be precluded.
- (6) Thanks the riders who braved the weather conditions on the day and those that contributed to fundraising efforts through registration.
- (7) Highlights that the 2020 event raised funds for the JCP Empowering Youth program, the BEAST, which targets at-risk and vulnerable young people who have the potential to be leaders within their own communities.
- (8) Congratulates the Rotary Club of Central Launceston, Sally Fletcher and the volunteers on another outstanding community event. (3 December 2020)

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr Woodruff)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs Rylah—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Government's continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses.

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr Woodruff, by leaving out all words after "That the House:—" and inserting instead:

- “(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise have.

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- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio.” (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party’s recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania’s Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

9 Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.
- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
